The increase has perhaps been somewhat stimulated by the prospect of the Crystal Palace expedition, which, if all goes well, is to take place on Wednesday, June 3rd, and the start is to be from Fulwell Station at 10.15 a.m.

The Organ.—We are glad to be able to report considerable progress towards effecting the much needed repair and improvement of our Church Organ. A meeting, which, considering the unfavourable state of the weather, was well attended, was held at the Vicarage on the evening of Wednesday, May 6th. The proposals of Messrs. Klitz, for the repair and improvement of the Organ, were laid before the meeting, and it was unanimously resolved to undertake the whole of the work at once. A committee, consisting of the Vicar and Churchwardens, Messrs. G. H. Barlow, J. C. Rait, T. Bowling and J. Singleton was appointed to carry out the work. A subscription list was opened and, including the Easter Offertory, £10 15s. 10d., the sum of £123 15s. 10d. was put down. This has been further increased as the subscription list, given below, will show. As a sum of nearly £200 will probably be required, subscriptions are earnestly requested from all who take an interest in the services of our Church.
