The Temperance movement.—Crowded rooms and people turned away from the doors for want of room, has been the order of things for some weeks past at the Monday evening meetings of the Total Abstinence Society of Hampton and Hampton Hill. These gatherings have been made more attractive by the introduction of a more varied programme of songs and recitations, for which many who are interested in the cause have volunteered their services. Good work has been done, and many pledges (as many as 28 on one evening) have been signed. We are glad to recognise some of those who were last year led to temperate habits regularly attending the meetings.

Provident Club.—The distribution of the money paid into the Provident Club will take place at the Vicarage on Wednesday, December 9th, at 11 o'clock. We earnestly invite any who do not at present belong to begin next year. It is not only the addition of the interest which is valuable, but the keeping together small sums, which otherwise would probably disappear, till they have mounted up to a goodly sum, for the purchase of clothes, boots or coals, at the time when they are most required.

Missionary Working Party.—The Working Party commenced its meetings on Friday, November 20th, and they will be continued fortnightly throughout the winter. Let us commend this effort to do something for missions to the consideration of the ladies of this place, who will be gladly welcomed if they will take a share in its labours. The subscription is 4s. per annum, 2s. 6d. of which goes to the parent

ociety, and the remainder is retained for the purchase of materials. Those who are unable to attend the meetings may become members by making an annual payment of 2s. 6d.

Our Schools.—We give this month the annual balance sheet as presented to H M. Inspector of Schools. The subscriptions we regret to say, especially the smaller ones, have fallen off, and consequently there is an adverse balance to meet in the coming year. We would most earnestly plead the necessity for renewed and increased support. The annual inspection took place on Wednesday and Thursday, November 18th and 19th, and we shall probably be able to give the Inspector's report in our January number.
