The Unemployed.—During the early months of the winter it was hoped that the want of work would not be found so great as it was last year. Now, however, we are sorry to say there are as many, if not more than ever, who cannot find work to do. This may, perhaps, be accounted for by the open weather which we have had throughout the winter, which has enabled employers to get all work in hand finished, and they are not inclined to commence a fresh job so early in the season. Whatever the cause may be, there can be no doubt that there has been much distress of late amongst the families of many of our working men, and that it has in many cases been difficult to get sufficient bread to eat. The attempt which has been made to provide some work has unfortunately been limited by the amount of funds, but we trust that the two or three days work which have been found for a good many, may have proved some help to them in enabling them to tide over this difficult time, till the work comes in again. It may be well to explain that the deep drain which has been cut along part of the Church Road will, it is hoped, cut off some of the water which at present renders it impossible to dig graves in the Churchyard deep enough for more than one interment.
