Our oldest Missionary Society has reached a goodly age, and on June 6th, celebrates its 188th anniversary, by holding its Annual Public Meeting in St. James' Hall at 2 p.m. We have been requested to insert this notice in the Parish Magazine, in the hope that some amongst us may feel inclined to attend it and hear something of the great work which the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts is carrying on. The Annual Sermon will be preached in St. Paul's Cathedral, on Wednesday, June 19th, by the Lord Bishop of Chester, the service commencing at 11 o'clock.

Our Flower Show.—The Show of the Hampton Hill and Hampton Horticultural and Cottage Garden Society is now definitely fixed for Wednesday, July 17th, and will be held, by the kind permission of Mr. J. P. Kitchin, at the Manor House, Hampton. The Schedule, which is now published, contains a long list of prizes offered for competition, and the special list is longer than ever. So far there is good promise in the garden world, fruit trees covered with blossom, untouched by frost or east wind. We hope this genial spring weather may be followed by a sunny summer, so that in the plenty of the present season, we may forget the gloom and damp of the summer of 1888. The judging in the competition of Cottage Gardens, for which there are many entries, commenced on Monday, May 20th.

Cricket Club.—There seems to be no limit to the enthusiasm which is continually showing itself in the cause of cricket in our parish. Notwithstanding the fact that there are already three or four cricket clubs in Hampton Hill, two more have lately sprung into existence in connection with the two branches of the Working Men's Club. either case the club has been formed with a view to giving recreation and amusement to its members, but the club connected with the original Institute is more ambitious and aspires one day to be the Representative Club of the Parish of Hampton Hill. Whether success will attend this effort must depend very much on whether a ground can be obtained in Bushey Park. We understand that no efforts will be spared to induce the authorities to make this concession, and that they will shortly be approached on this subject. Windsor Royal Show.—We would call attention to the Show of the Royal Agricultural Society of England, which is to be held at Windsor during the last week in June. Under the very shadow of the ancient Castle, and thus as it were under special Royal Patronage, the Windsor Show promises to outstrip all previous attempts in the completeness and extent of its arrangements. We are specially interested in the Bee department of the British Bee-Keepers Association, which annually takes a prominent position in the Society's Should the early days of June prove warm and sunny there will doubtless be a very large display of honey, as well as a large collection of modern bee-keeping appliances. The comparatively nearness of the Show, and the ease with which Windsor may be reached by train, should tempt many of our friends to take a day at Windsor during the Show week.

Crystal Palace Excursion .- Our Annual Outing for the Sunday School children is arranged for Thursday, June 6th. The start will be as usual from Fulwell Station at 10.15 a.m. The full benefit of the reduced rates for railway fares and admission is offered to all parishioners or friends of the children. Tickets can be obtained from the vicar, to include railway fare, admission and tea, for 3s. 4d. for adults, and 2s. for children under 15 years.

Our Schools.—On the 13th of May, we had a visit from the Diocesan Organizing Inspector, who had been invited for the purpose of thoroughly investigating our position, with a view to suggesting, if possible, some remedy for our present financial difficulties. His report has not yet come to hand, but we trust that he may be able to point out some means of effecting a reduction in our expenses. We would, however, remind our subscribers that this is not the only way of meeting the difficulty. An increase in the number and amounts of subscriptions would be especially acceptable at the present moment. We give a list of subscribers for 1888, but we regret to say that the total amount received from them is considerably less than it was four years ago. The collectors will shortly come round, and we trust that their appeal will not be made in vain.
