Our Schools -We have suffered considerable loss in our staff of Miss Spencer who, during the year-and-a-half she was with us as second assistant-mistress in the girls' school, had given great satisfaction to the Managers, left before the summer holidays. Mr. Basey, our first assitsant-master, is leaving now, having obtained the head mastership of the Great Yarmouth Blue-Coat-School He has been with us nearly five years, and during that time has given great satisfaction to all. He has been very successful in passing the boys of his class both at the Government and Diocesan Examinations. We shall miss him, too, as a very regular and efficient member of the Choir. The good wishes of many go with him, that he may be as successful in his larger undertaking at Great Yarmouth as he has been at Hampton Hill.

Infant Day Nursery.—The balance sheet, which is made up to March 31st, should have appeared before. Last year no application was made for subscriptions, and in consequence the amount received fell far short of the usual amount. The adverse balance, which it was hoped would gradually have been wiped out, was thus increased to a large extent. Subscriptions have come in better this year, but still not in sufficient amount to cover the annual expenses. It is hoped that some effort may be made to place this most useful and excellent institution upon a sounder financial basis. The Managers will further be grateful for presents of toys, clothes, scraps, &c., and also for all encouragement given to the mothers to send their children, when they must leave them, to a place where they are sure to be treated with tender care and kindness. During the past year the Nursery suffered a great loss by the death of its excellent Matron, Mrs. Bristow. The present Matron is her niece, and during her life-time was her assistant.

Winter Entertainments.—A meeting has been convened at the Boys' School, on Thursday, October 3rd, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of forming a committee of those willing to assist in getting up the Entertainments for the ensuing winter season. These have been a great

help to our School, Library, &c., in years past, besides affording excellent amusement for the long evenings. They can only be made a success by the hearty co-operation of all. There are many new comers in the village who, we trust, will take an interest in them and support them in every way possible. It will be proposed to restore the cheap concerts-6d., 3d. and 2d., which proved attractive for some years, and to hold them more frequently, if only adequate support is forthcoming. Some of our old dramatic friends will no doubt again take to the boards—we trust with the assistance of some good recruits. Invitations to attend the meeting have been issued, but if any who take an interest in these matters have not received a special notice, we trust they will not on that account stay away. Having regard to the many applications which were received last winter from various institutions for the use of the Schools for Entertainments, it is proposed that this season all such applications shall be laid before the Committee who will endeavour to arrange so as to avoid the clashing of various Those who wish to have entertainments are therefore recommended to send in their applications at once to the Vicar, in order that they may be laid before the Committee before they make their programme for the season.

Transfer of Glebe.—On the 2nd of August a deed of transfer was completed, by which about eighteen acres of glebe land adjoining the Vicarage grounds and Churchyard were annexed to the living of Hampton Hill. It has long been thought that more provision should be made, out of the continually increasing funds of the Vicarage of Hampton, for the needs of the parish of Hampton Hill, which, containing nearly half the population of the old parish, had received towards its endowment no more than 12 acres of glebe. Although at the present moment this land will afford little substantial benefit to the incumbent, yet perhaps, at no very distant date, it may be required for building purposes, and its value largely increased By this means an endowment would be secured to the living, and it would no longer be dependent upon the somewhat objectionable method of raising funds by pew-rents. This is a matter which is of considerable importance, not only to the Vicar, but also to the parishioners, whose spiritual needs will be thus more effectually and permanently provided for; and we are sure they will join with the Vicar in offering their thanks to the Rev. R. Digby Ram, as present Vicar of Hampton, for the facilities which he has afforded towards carrying out the scheme, and the personal sacrifice which he has made.

Total Abstinence Society.—The Winter Monday evening gatherings will re-commence at the Congregational School, on Monday, October 7th, when our old friend Mr. Raywood is to give an address and his usual musical entertainment.
