The Confirmation.—On the 17th March, The Lord Bishop of Marlborough held a Confirmation in the Parish Church. His Lordship was met at the Church by the Rev. R. S. de Ricci (representing the Vicar) and Mr. W. C. B. Hall, and after robing at the Vicarage, he joined the Clergy in the Vestry where a procession was formed, headed by the choir singing the hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers," next came the Clergy and the Bishop, attended by the Rev. David Anderson (late Rural Dean of Hampton, and now Rector of St George's, Hanover Square), who acted as Chaplain. After the Preface had been read, the Bishop returned to the Chancel step, accompanied by his Chaplain and Mr. de Ricci; the first verse of a hymn was then sung, and then the Bishop commenced Confirming the candidates, taking two at a time. When the occupants of two seats had been confirmed another verse of the hymn was sung while the next group of candidates took up their position near the Chancel step, and so on until the end. The Bishop then entered the pulpit, and taking for his text Acts viii. vv. 14-17, delivered an address to the newly Confirmed, conceived in a spirit of earnest fatherly care and affection, and which evidently

made a deep impression upon all present. After the conclusion of the service the procession was re-formed, and when the Clergy had returned to the Vestry, the newly-confirmed rapidly filed out of the Church, the large congregation waiting until all had left. The Bishop and the Clergy were afterwards entertained at luncheon at the Vicarage by direction of the Vicar and Mrs. Bligh; and before taking his departure the Bishop expressed his entire satisfaction with all that had been done. Our thanks are due to the Churchwardens, Mr. W. C. B. Hall and Mr. Storey, for their valuable assistance; and also to Mr. Towell and Mr. Dench for leaving their own pressing work to come and help in the Choir. The Clergy present were the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Marlborough; Rev. R. Digby Ram, Vicar of Hampton; Rev. D. Anderson, Rector of St. George's, Hanover Square; Rev. W. Archer, Vicar of Hampton Wick; Rev. D. L. McAnally, Chaplain of Hampton Court Palace; Rev. J. B. Clark, Curate of Twickenham; Rev. G. R. Harrison, Curate of Hampton; and Rev. R.
