Home Industry Exhibition.—This Exhibition was brought to a successful issue on Wednesday, May 20th. The various productions for competition, as well as a large and valuable loan collection of paintings, curios and relics of antiquity were staged in the Infants' School. The Exhibition was opened at 3 o'clock by Lady Elizabeth Cust, sister of the Vicar, and throughout the afternoon was well filled by those who were not deterred by the higher entrance of 1s. At 5 o'clock the price of admission was reduced to 3d., and by the time for the distribution of prizes by Mrs. Bligh, 6 p.m., there was a large number of people assembled. It would be an invidious task to attempt to fasten the highest merit to any particular one of the many good things entered for competition. We think we may say that all the prizes were well won, and if there could have been more second or third prizes, they would have been well merited. The only fault we have to find is not with those who did compete, but with those who did not. We think there might have been more entries, and we trust that another year many may be encouraged by the success of this Exhibition to try their hand, and win a prize for needlework, knitting, carving or some other handicraft. The loan exhibition, which was full of interest and instruction, filled up the remainder of the room and overflowed into the class room, which was also used for tea and light refreshments.
