Clock and Bells.—It is now more than five years since our Jubilee Memorial, our Victoria Tower and Spire was finished. The fabric was finished, but the Tower and Spire could not be said to be complete without a Clock and without Bells. There has been a sufficient reason for the delay. The cost of the Tower and Spire so greatly exceeded the original estimate that it was not till October, 1891, that it was entirely paid for. Then it was thought that it would not be well to press too hard upon our many liberal contributors, by asking at once for subscriptions for the Clock and Bells. After a pause, a new departure is to be made, which we trust will result in a speedy completion of not only the Tower and Spire, but of S. James' Parish Church. The old Building Committee, which has existed for six years, met again, and once more is sending forth an appeal to the Inhabitants of Hampton Hill, and to all who are interested in the Church and Village. It is estimated that a Clock with four dials and apparatus for striking the hours and chiming the quarters will cost

£150. A good set of eight Harrington's Tubular Bells will cost £250, and allowing a margin of £50, we must not expect to complete the work for less than £450. At present we have in hand £115 4s. 7d.; made up principally of Offertories, £60 5s. 7d.; Sale of Work, £40; and Concert, £6 10s. 0d. In addition to this we have promises, many of them unsolicited, to the amount of £89 7s. 0d., giving us a total of £204 11s. 7d. to start with. We trust that this appeal will not go forth in vain, but that subscriptions will flow in fast. We would venture to put in a personal plea from the Vicar, to whom it would be a very solid gratification, if indeed it cannot be completely finished, yet that the whole of the money were collected, and the order given for the completion of the work before he bids farewell to his work and home and friends at Hampton Hill.

Our Schools.—Work has been going on steadily during the past half-year, and much more satisfactorily in consequence of the staff of Teachers being fully made up. Our greatest difficulty is the same as it has long been, the finding sufficient means. Some people may think that £700 or £800 per annum is a large income, and more than enough to meet all the possible cost of the Schools. So it might have have been some years ago, enough and a great deal more than enough.

We must remember, however, how things are changed, how much more thorough is the education of the present day, how much more exacting the Education Department becomes as time goes on. At the present moment there are rumours, which in all probability are only too well founded, that we shall be required to improve the accommodation of our Schools at a very large cost. How then can our schools be maintained? Only by the liberal support and assistance of the whole community, the rich and poor, business men and tradespeople, and not excepting the parents of the scholars who receive the greatest and most direct benefit. All must do what they can, or we may be quite sure that we shall fail to find sufficient funds to keep the Schools going, and be driven to a Board. Our Collectors will soon be on their rounds and it is hoped will meet with a liberal response in the shape of renewed and additional subscriptions. We have just received a letter from the Education Department relative to the small charge still made to children who attend the schools. In this letter we are told that the managers have the power to charge 1d. to each child in the school, and to remit it to those who have made a full attendance the previous week.

Ladies' Entertainments Committee.—President: Hon. Mrs. Bligh, Mrs. Hubbard, Miss Roe, Mrs. Druitt, Miss Crigan, Miss Barker, Miss Godfrey. We must congratulate the Ladies' Committee on the success of their first season. It will be seen by the accounts which are given below, that inclusive of the sum expended by order of the County Council, there was a net gain of £14 8s. 0d. on the three Entertainments given. But this is not saying all. The Entertainments were thoroughly good and highly appreciated by the large audiences which they drew. It would be difficult to say which deserved the palm. Each one was excellent in the Tableaux, the Concert, the Dramatic Entertainment. We hope that success will be an encouragement to the Ladies' Committee to continue their very useful work next season, and that success will crown their efforts for many a year to come.
