My DEAR FRIENDS,

I am glad to say the Special Lenten Services have been, so far, very well attended.

The Holy Week Services will be announced by handbills. On the Thursday before Good Friday, there will be a preparation service for the Easter Communion, to which I would earnestly invite not only all communicants and the newly confirmed, but also those who have not been in the habit of coming.

On Good Friday, the services will be at 11 a.m.; at 2 p.m.; and at 6.30 p.m. The afternoon service will last for an hour, and will consist chiefly of hymns and short addresses upon the "Last Words" of the dying Saviour. There is not a more solemn hour in the year than the one in which we commemorate the closing scene in the earthly life of the world's Redeemer. It would seem that such an hour could not be more appropriately spent than in the House of God. The offertories on Good Friday will be for the St. James' Home, Fulham.

On Easter Day, there will be celebrations of the Holy Communion at 6.45; at 8; and after the morning service. The newly confirmed will then come for the first time, and I hope their parents and friends will, if possible, come with them. All communicants are requested to be kind enough to put their names in the basket in the Church porch. This is a great assistance to me, as it enables me to keep a correct list, according to the requirements of the Bishop.

The Confirmation, which took place at our Church on Monday, the 22nd ult., was a very impressive service, and will always be remembered by those who were present. The following were the numbers confirmed:—

A Meeting was held in the Mission Room on the 30th ult., when a thoroughly representative Committee was elected to carry out this object.

A Jubilee character will also, no doubt, be imparted to our Treats and Summer Festivities, some special feature being added, especially for the children. For this purpose, a larger fund than usual will be needed, and, therefore, I would ask that the subscriptions to our "Treats' Fund" may be increased.

There may also be some further effort to mark the "Longest Reign," which has at the same time been the happiest, the most peaceful, and the most prosperous in the history of our beloved country.
