My dear Friends,

Our Summer Treats and Festivities will occupy a good deal of our attention for some weeks to come. The Sunday School Excursion is to be to Brighton again this year, partly because it is the easiest Seaside place to reach as regards both cost and time, and partly because the trip there last year was so thoroughly successful. We have arranged with the Railway Company for a special train, which will start from Fulwell at about 7 a.m., on Friday, the 24th inst., arriving at Brighton soon after 9 a.m. The members of the Choir will also go. And by the kindness of Mrs. FitzWygram the members of her two Bible Classes will also form a section of the party. The return fares for friends will be 4/- for adults, and 2/- for children. Tickets for tea will be 9d. for adults, and 7d. for children. All tickets must be purchased before the 22nd inst., and may be obtained from Mr. Makepeace, Mr. Dawkins, the Day and Sunday School Teachers, and the District Visitors.

The Infants School Treat will be at the Vicarage, on the first Saturday in July. Contributions for the various treats will be thankfully received. About £30 will be required. Miss Barnard has again kindly undertaken to collect and receive subscriptions.

I am asked to draw special attention to the approaching Flower Show, which is fixed to take place in the Vicarage Grounds, on Wednesday, the 13th day of July. It is hoped that all who can will support the Committee by exhibiting something. Even those who have little hope of obtaining a prize can help the show by competing, and they may at the same time meet with unexpected success. I would especially appeal to those entitled to exhibit in the Cottagers' Class. Very often this class has not met with the support it ought to have done. I believe it ought to be the chief feature of the Show. Special prizes are offered for the children, full particulars of which can be obtained from Mr Dowsett and from the Day School Teachers. It is hoped that the prizes will be distributed by Lady Hartland.

An account of the contributions kindly given for the supply of some new cassocks for the Choir will be found below. I have pleasure in acknowledging the gift of a handsome Hymn Book for the Organ from Mr. Makepeace.

On Sunday, the 19th inst., the annual collections will take place for the Richmond Hospital. Many of our sick people make use of this hospital, and it is doing a most excellent work in the neighbourhood.

On Wednesday, the 29th, the Annual Festival of the Girls' Friendly Society in this neighbourhood will take place at our Church, at 3.30 p.m. After service the members will adjourn to the Vicarage Grounds for tea and games. Branches from Hampton, Sunbury, Hanworth, and other villages are expected.
