## The Vicarage, July 1st, 1899.

My dear Friends,

The chief parochial event of last month was our Excursion to Southsea. We had a special train, and our party numbered 485 all told. In addition to the Sunday School children, the members of the Choir and Mrs. FitzWygram's Bible Classes went, the expenses of the Choir being defrayed out of the Churchwardens' Fund, and those of the Bible Classes were entirely paid by Mrs. FitzWygram. The day was an ideal one for such an "outing." The long journey was pleasantly accomplished. The Teachers and the members of the Choir had breakfast upon our arrival, in the saloon on the pier, and the whole of our party had tea in the same place in the afternoon, the catering being most satisfactory. The behaviour of the children was excellent, and the supervision and attention of the Teachers left nothing to be desired. We all felt we had every cause to be thankful on our arrival at home for a thoroughly enjoyable day without a single drawback. The account of the expenses will be found below. The Infants and a few other children who could not go to Southsea, will have tea and games at the Vicarage this afternoon.

The Sunday Schools have had their turn, we have yet to think of the Day Schools. On St. James' Day, the 25th inst., their turn will come. The children will meet at the Schools at 2 p.m., and will march to the Church, headed by a Brass Band. After a short service, they will go to the Vicarage Grounds for Tea and the usual games, cocoa-nut shies, "Punch and Judy," &c., &c. Members of the Congregation, Parents and friends, will be welcomed in the grounds.

Members of the Congregation and parishioners generally are very earnestly invited to attend the Services. Mr. Carpenter, who will preach in the evening, is a brother of the Bishop of Ripon.

Contributions in kind for the Children's Tea will be thankfully received at the Vicarage, before 10 o'clock on the 25th inst. The following include most of our wants:—bread, butter, cake, tea, sugar, milk, toys and sweets.

The Annual Girls' Friendly Society Festival for this Rural Deanery will take place in the afternoon of the 5th.

The members of the Lads' Brigade will assemble in full uniform at "Fairlight" (Dr. Howard's) at 6.30 p.m. on Monday, the 10th inst., and will march to the Vicarage for tea and games.

On Friday, the 15th inst., the Annual Tea and Social Evening for the members of the Communicants' Association will take place in the Vicarage Garden at 5.30 p.m.

In future the "General Fund" of the Church will be described as the "Churchwardens' Fund," which is a more definite term. The Fund is under the direction of the Churchwardens for the following important purposes:—the cleaning, warming, lighting and repairing of the Church; the payment of the Organist and Choir expenses; the blowing and tuning of the Organ; the ringing of the Bells and winding of the Clock; the payment of the Verger, and the keeping of the Churchyard in order, &c., &c. It will be seen that all these matters are necessary, and that a very considerable sum is required for them.

The Flower Show will this year be at Hampton. It will take place in the grounds of the President, Captain Christie, on Wednesday, July 12th. The Committee are very anxious that all should do their best to make the Show a success.
