Part of our Church Accounts appeared last month and the rest of them are printed now. The total sum of £943 is very pleasing and I should like to express my deep gratitude to all the subscribers who have so readily responded to the appeals made to them, and who have given such generous help to the various organizations. We have lately lost some very good and kind helpers, and in the coming year I can foresee that we shall have to find many new subscribers to take their places. However, the way in which help has come in the past gives us ample encouragement for the future.

The CONFIRMATION at Hampton Church, I have no doubt, made a great impression on the minds of all the candidates. We had 43 from St. James's, 12 of whom were adults.

A pleasing event during the last month was the visit of the local Company of the Territorials to the Church, on the 21st. The Service was very stirring. The Commanding Officer has asked that they may come again, and I am sure it will give us great pleasure to welcome them.

The ANNUAL MEETING of the C.E.M.S. took place on the 23rd. An excellent report was read by Mr. Evans, the Secretary, giving an account of the year's work. The numbers had gone up from 38 to 55 in the year. Mr. Meynell presented the Financial Statement, which showed a slight deficiency. The above officers were reelected, and the following form the new Committee:—Messrs. Basey, Daines, Jordan, Gamgee, Jones, Lavington, Marsden, and Oatway. The more the Society is known the better it is liked.

The MISSIONARY SALE OF WORK will, I expect, take place on the 15th June, in the Church Room. Any contributions of useful and saleable articles will be most thankfully received at the vicarage, and I hope a large number of people will come and buy.

The great event of the month will of course be the CORONATION. George V. has already won the hearts of the people, and the whole country will rejoice over the happy event on the 22nd, and pray that God will indeed bless our King and Queen. Many of our people will go to see the procession, but we shall have a simple service at St. James's, when parts of the Coronation Service will be used, at 12 o'clock, and I hope that many of our people will come. Our chief Services will be on the following Sunday, when we shall sing Coronation Hymns and the Anthem written for the occasion. Our new Organist, Mr. Gilberthorpe, will commence his duties on that day, and will give an Organ Recital after the Evening Service.

The Local Festivities will take place on the Saturday, but you will hear all about these from other sources. I shall be glad to receive the names of any ladies who are willing to assist in waiting upon the old people at the dinner at 12 o'clock. I want thirty for this purpose.

The SUNDAY SCHOOL EXCURSION is fixed for Tuesday the 27th, and will be to Portsmouth. This will be most attractive this year as it will be at the time of the Naval Review.
