It was a great joy to see so many Communicants, and the Choir, with Mr. Russe, deserves a word of praise for the manner in which the musical portions of the service were rendered; I also thank you for your generous Easter Offering.

Friday, April 30th, has been fixed for the first meeting of the Parochial Electors. It takes place in the Boys' School at 8 p.m., and I hope a large number will be present. The Church Parochial Council will, in future, form the Finance Committee and also the Sidesmen.

Confirmation Classes are now being formed. The girls will meet in the Vestry on Mondays at 8, and the lads on Fridays at 8. A warm welcome will be given to any who desire to attend these classes for instruction. The service takes place at Hampton Church, on Monday, June 28th.

Wednesday, May 26th, has been fixed, provisionally, for the dedication of the War Memorial, but due notice will be given as to time, etc.

A very pleasant ceremony took place in the Boys' School on March 31st, when I presented to Miss Singleton a beautiful mirror on behalf of the Managers, Teachers and Boys, as a token of their good wishes on her approaching marriage.

A considerable expense is about to be incurred in certain repairs, painting, etc., of the exterior of the Church. Messrs. Singleton have secured the contract, and the work will be commenced at once. The Churchwardens will gladly receive any contributions towards the cost—nearly £100.

May I call your attention to an appeal which Mr. Basey makes elsewhere on behalf of the C.L.B.? Additional funds are urgently needed, and I hope they will be speedily forthcoming.

The excellent work carried on by the Church of England Waifs' and Strays' Society will be brought to your notice on May 16th, when sermons will be preached by the Rev. W. H. Andrews, one of the Society's Secretaries.

The third list of Subscribers to the Curate's Fund appears this month. I much appreciate the generous response which is being given to this appeal.

May God give to us all great blessing at the Ascension and Whitsuntide Festivals.

LONDON DIOCESAN MISSIONARY DAY .-- A Missionary Day for the Diocese is being arranged by the Diocesan Board of Missions. It will be held in the City, on Saturday, June 19th, under the presidency of the Lord Bishop of London, and will have the sympathy and support of the Lord Mayor, who will give the opening address at one of the meetings. The "Day" will begin at 8 a.m., with a service of Holy Communion in St. Paul's Cathedral. Meetings (morning and afternoon) will be held in the Guildhall, and addresses will be given by several overseas Bishops who will be in England for the Lambeth Conference. A Service of Intercession in the Cathedral, at 5.30 p.m., will bring the "Day" to a close. The Right Rev. Bishop Brent, of the Diocese of Western New York, has consented to be the preacher at this service. The War has accentuated Mankind's Need of Christ; and Peace, now happily established, is presenting new and altogether unique opportunities of making Him and His saving grace known throughout the world. On the other hand, the financial position of all Missionary Societies is being adversely affected by the existing high rates of exchange. These circumstances are a distinct Challenge to the Church, to press forward in the Divine enterprise of Missions The purpose of "the Missionary Day" is, by God's blessing, to bring home this Challenge to the minds and hearts of Church people, and it is the most earnest hope of the Bishop that they will assemble in large numbers from all parts of the Diocese to seek from the Holy Ghost enlightenment and renewed inspiration. The subject for consideration will be "The Triumphs and Tasks of the Gospel." The programme, together with details as to arrangements, tickets, meals, etc., will be announced next month. A Missionary Meeting will be held in the Town Hall, Twickenham, on Wednesday, May 5th, at 8 p.m., the chief speakers will be Major-General E. R. Kenyon, C.B., C.M.G., R.E., and Dr. Lachlan, F.R.S.

## Parish News.

CHURCH LADS' BRIGADE.—At the monthly parade of the Company, an interesting ceremony will take place of Saluting the Colours after the Inspection. If the weather is unfavourable, it will take place at the next monthly parade. the Easter Vestry, the Annual Balance Sheet was presented; the Treasurer was able to show a balance of £1 12s. od. It is hoped a favourable response will be made to the appeal for funds, owing to the greatly increased cost of equipment. Money is greatly needed to pay for the Lads' Medals, to be distributed in May, estimated to cost  $f_3$  ros. od., and also for new uniforms since obtained, £5 ros. od. The lads intending to go to Camp this year will hear with pleasure that the Headquarters have arranged to go to Walmer. Those who were there when War was declared in 1914, will remember the excitement in camp, especially the Colonel's wire to the War Office stating that 1,000 lads were willing to offer themselves for immediate service. be entitled to go to camp, all lads must be efficient before July 1st (20 Bible Classes and 20 Drills). The Treasurer acknowledges, with many thanks, a donation of 10/- from R. Elliott, Esq., also one of 5/- from H. Rew, Esq. Confirmation Classes will shortly be formed.

EASTER VESTRY.—This was held in the Church Room, on Thursday, April 8th, at 8 p.m.; there was a large attendance. The Church Accounts, presented by Mr. Churchwarden Evans, showed a balance on the right side, and this was the case with all the accounts, the Day Schools excepted, though the adverse balance in this case had been very greatly reduced under the efficient management of the Treasurer-Miss Brewer. The Vicar again nominated Mr. C. H. Carpenter as his Churchwarden, and the Parishioners unanimously elected Mr. C. H. Evans to represent them, in both cases thanks were expressed for their valuable services in the past. The various Parochial accounts will be published in due course.
