My DEAR PEOPLE,

The Services of Commemoration of Thanksgiving on the Sunday before Armistice Day were not quite as well attended as they should have been. Considering the number from this Parish who gave their lives for their brethren in Hampton Hill as much as in any other part of the Empire, it was only to be expected that few would be absent from the spiritual Home of the Parish on such a day. However, those who were present, and we were glad to see amongst the congregation members of our District Council and our local Fire Brigade, were much impressed by the service. Many were doubtless comforted in their bereavement, and all were encouraged to go forward with God's help in the task of consolidating the benefit derived from such a sacrifice of noble lives.

When you receive this month's magazine we shall be in the season of Advent. It is a season of fast and special spiritual endeavour. At a time when we seem to be living for the present it is well to be reminded of the great Eternal Future, and of the necessity of using every opportunity of preparing ourselves for it. I would draw your attention to the service which will be held on the Wednesdays in Advent, and would ask you to let nothing hinder you from being present.

The Christmas Festival will be upon us very quickly now. Don't let the worldly festivities of the season too much engross your thoughts and attentions. It is the Festival of the Nativity of Jesus, our Saviour. Our first duty, therefore, is to pay reverent homage at the Manger Throne. This great act of devotion requires much individual preparation during the weeks of Advent,

and all Communicants should endeavour to be present at the special preparation Service for Christmas Communion, which will be held on the Monday before Christmas, at 8 o'clock in the evening.

This year St. Andrew's Day clashes with Advent Sunday. We have, therefore, fixed Wednesday, December 3rd, as our Day of Intercession for the work of the Church Overseas. I am sure that all who wish to carry out Christ's injunction to "Go and preach the Gospel to every creature," will be anxious to take a part in the chain of continuous Intercession. You will find a list in the Church porch, kindly place your name opposite the half-hour you can best spare.

We have been asked by two Societies to have what we call a Gift Sunday this year. That is a Sunday when the children can bring their discarded toys and picture books, etc., to the Children's Service, and offer them as Christmas presents to the boys and girls who are not so fortunate as they are in their reception of gifts from Santa Claus. Our Gift Service will be at 3 o'clock on Sunday, December 14th. After the Service the toys, etc., will be packed in two parcels, the one to go to the Waifs' and Strays' Society, and the other to the Colonial and Continental Church Society for distribution amongst the children in the wilds of Canada. I do hope we shall have two large parcels to send away.

I would draw your attention to the Balance Sheet in connection with Hampton Hill Nursing Association. The fact that Nurse Fozard paid 1,897 visits in the course of nine months is sufficient evidence of the need of such an organisation in the parish. We shall this year be without the grant of £50 from the Central Council. It is hoped, therefore, that many new subscribers will be added to the present list.
