A patriotic effort is being made throughout Middlesex to largely strengthen and improve our Volunteer forces, both in men and equipment. In the course of a few days everyone will receive an appeal to help. In no single case ought the appeal to be in vain. Shillings and half-crowns will be thankfully received, as well as larger sums. Dr. Dashwood Howard is appointed to receive subscriptions for Hampton Hill, Dr. Merriman Cooper for Hampton, and Mr. de Wette for Hampton Court.

Three Lectures on "Christian Evidences" will be given on the first three Fridays in the month at the Eastbank Mission Room, at 3.45, by the Rev. W. H. Hornby Steer, Vicar of St. Philip's, Lambeth. The lectures are sure to be good. The subscription for membership of the Reading Union is One Shilling a year.
