MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The Sunday School Excursion to the Crystal Palace on the 14th ult. was in every way satisfactory. Our total number was 254. We left Fulwell Station at 10.14 a.m., and were all safe within the Palace in less than an hour. The day was spent in examining the Naval and Military relics and wonders and in visiting the side shows, &c. At 4 o'clock we assembled for tea, for which all were ready. At 7.52 we started for home. The Railway Company had forgotten to reserve carriages for us, and so we had to scramble in anywhere, much to the discomfort, no doubt, of the ordinary passengers. The Lad's Brigade Band was ready for us when we arrived, and with a great display of flags we marched to the centre of the village, and after giving cheers for everybody, we went tired to bed, thankful for a happy day and no disaster. Nearly all the teachers were present, and they were most kind in their care of the children. The conduct of the children was beyond reproach.

I imagine and hope that all our minds are now centred upon the coming Sale of Work. It promises to be considerably larger than was contemplated by some of us at the outset. The greatest willingness to help has been shewn on all hands. It is, however, at present impossible to forecast the result as the "work" is only just beginning to come in. A list of helpers at the stalls will be found below, so far as at present arranged. Work may be sent to any of these or, if desired, direct to the Vicarage. Gifts of any kind will be acceptable. We shall be thankful for anything that will sell. Second-hand things for the "Jumble" Stall will be sent for if notice is sent to the Secretary. I am very glad to be able to announce that the Lord Bishop of London has most kindly promised to come and open the Sale on the first day at 2.30 p.m. I need scarcely express the hope that a very large number of our friends will be present to welcome his Lordship, and he is sure to have some wise words, well worth hearing, to say to us. A pretty feature at the opening ceremony will be the

children's "Battle of Flowers," which is being promoted by Mrs. Elland Norton. The procession, headed by the band, will start from Laurel Dene at 1.45, and march along the High Street and Windmill Road to the Vicarage. Prize banners will be given to the best decorated turn-outs. Entertainments and side shows are being arranged by the Committee. The object of the sale is to provide £100 for the Day Schools and a further sum for the repair and cleaning of the Organ, for the renovation of the Vestry and for new matting for the aisles of the Church. It is six years since our last "Fancy Fair," and if the present effort is successful, I hope it may be many years before another appeal of a similar kind has to be made. The admission will be one shilling from 2 to 6, and sixpence from 6 to 10 p.m. on the first day. The Children's Treat will take place on the second day. The stall holders will be glad to receive contributions or promises of help *as soon as possible* that they may complete their arrangements. With the usual Hampton Hill goodness of heart and with fine weather, I think we may count upon a considerable measure of success.
