#### GIRLS' SCHOOL.

"The School has again passed a very good examination, and there are evidences in all divisions of careful work with a high aim.

There is general answering with a pleasing tone in Division III, and the subjects have been correctly and practically dealt with. The girls' intelligence would justify a somewhat deeper teaching.

Much earnestness and pains have been expended in Division II. The answering on the Scripture lessons is bright and accurate, and the Prayer Book has been carefully explained. The knowledge of the Catechism lacks clearness.

Most of the work in Division I is thoroughly excellent, especially the New Testament and the Prayer Book, and the Old Testament is almost as good considering the subject. The explanation of the Catechism is practical, but might be fuller."
