THE DAY SCHOOLS. COPY OF INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

"Boys.—These boys are in capital order and have learned to work. Written exercises are good in Writing, Spelling and Composition, and are all thoroughly revised by the feachers. Oral answering is fairly general and in good form.

GIRLS.—The Head Teacher inspires her staff with much zeal and earnestness, and these are reflected in the demeanour of the girls. The work generally is satisfactory and Reading is quite good. The order is excellent and the girls are bright and happy.

In the Boys' and Girls' Schools the upper classes should have definite times set apart for silent preparation of Geography, History, and such like subjects, so as to teach them how to use books and to help themselves to information.

Infants.—Good sound work is being done here under difficulties, as three classes are habitually taught side by side in the main room. The effectiveness of the instruction is much aided by the excellence of the order and the regularity of the attendance."
