Boys.

"Both discipline and instruction are commendable, and the general progress does credit to the staff. The work of the lowest class has been hampered by changes of teacher, and presents a less satisfactory aspect."

## GIRLS.

"The girls are receiving a careful training, their behaviour is very good, and both scholars and teachers are evidently well disposed towards one another and their daily work."

## INFANTS.

"Epidemics have necessitated closure upon two occasions during the educational year, but the school has continued to do satisfactory work and to be

capably and pleasantly conducted, whilst the attendance is remarkably good. It is pleasant to hear that immediate provision for the adequate heating of the mainroom is to be made."

"The Boys' School is again Excellent. In Division I. a full syllabus has been carefully prepared and the boys have gained much knowledge of a definite and valuable character; the answering was spirited and intelligent.

"In Division II. there was good answering on the Old Testament and Prayer Book; the New Testament subjects appeared to need more revision. The work in Divisions III. and IV. has been very capably prepared; the answering was bright and intelligent and the interest of the boys has been fully aroused."
