Hunter.

The Church Pageant at Fulham seems to have astonished everybody who saw it. It was extremely well done, and must have simplified some points in Church history to a great many people. I am sorry that I was not able to get tickets for many of those who wished to have them. It may be some consolation to them to know that tens of thousands of others were in the same position.

The Church Missionary Exhibition, at the Agricultural Hall, has been visited by immense crowds. Nine members of our Congregation have been assisting as Stewards, and have been most constant in their attendance.

I am most anxious to hear of someone who would take charge of a class of youths. Will some gentleman volunteer? It is very important work. It means giving up one hour on the Sunday afternoon. It would be an immense help.

The Girls' Friendly Society Annual Festival, for the Deanery of Hampton, will take place on Wednesday, the 7th inst. There will be a distribution of prizes and certificates in the Vicarage grounds, followed by tea, after which there will be a Service in the Church at 6 p.m.

The Annual Meeting of the Communicants' Guild will be Thursday, the 8th inst., at 5.30 pm., in the Vicarage Garden if fine, or in the Church Room if wet.

I am asked to mention that the Hampton and Hampton Hill Flower Show will take place in the Manor House grounds, on Wednesday, the 14th inst. The Committee are making a great effort to secure success, and if the weather is favourable there is no doubt that they will attain it. Entries should be made through Mr. Hallt, the Secretary, as soon as possible. The Committee are very anxious to have the cordial support of the ladies.

The Annual Meeting of the Mothers' Union is fixed for Thursday, the 15th inst. There will be a short Service at 3 p.m., after which there will be an adjournment to the Vicarage Garden, or Church Room if the weather is bad, when an address will be given by a lady, and then there will be tea. I hope all the members will try to be present.

The St. James' Festival has always been a great occasion with us. This year St. James' Day is on a Sunday, and on that day there will be Celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7, 8 and 11 a.m. The preacher in the Evening will be the new Rural Dean, the Rev. Prebendary Prosser. The offertories, after deducting the usual amount for Church expenses, will be for the Treats' Fund. Children's Festivities will take place on the following Friday, the 30th inst. The Procession will start from the Schools, with the Fortescue House Band, at 2 p.m., and march through the village to Church for a short Service, after which the children will adjourn to the Vicarage field and we shall have as much frolic and fun as we can. The parents of the children will be heartly welcome immediately after the children's tea. We shall be thankful for any further contributions to the Treats' Fund, or for any gifts in kind. Full details will be given nearer the time.
