MY DEAR FRIENDS,

A General Meeting of the subscribers to the Nurse Fund was held in the Church Room on the 10th ult. The audited accounts were presented by Mrs. Stutchbury, and adopted. It was pointed out that although there was a balance in hand of £8 1s. 3d., this was partly the result of special efforts which we might not always be able to count upon, and therefore a larger number of subscribers is urgently needed. Mrs. Stutchbury expressed her desire to retire from the Secretaryship, but was ultimately prevailed upon to consent to continue in office until the end of the financial year, and she was unanimously elected. The following were elected to be the Committee for the ensuing year: Miss Barnard, Mrs. Garrett, Mrs. Job, Mrs. Stutchbury, Mrs. Swain, with the Vicar as Chairman, ex-officio. The satisfactory work carried out by the Nurse was referred to with much appreciation. There is no doubt that we are fortunate in having the position so satisfactorily filled. It was felt to be desirable that Mrs. Stutchbury should have the assistance of some lady who would call upon subscribers for their subscriptions, and Miss Lavington has since kindly consented to act in that capacity. The Nurse has paid 3086 visits during the past year. It was suggested that when the Nurse's services were employed by persons who could afford to pay for them, the Committee should send them in a bill; the charges to be fixed by the Committee after communication with the doctor attending the case.

We have a very useful little organization known as the "Married Women's Charity." This has been managed for many years by Mrs. FitzWygram, but her continued illness has made it necessary for it to be placed in other hands, and I am glad to say that Mrs. Schön, of Westwood, Park Road, has very kindly consented to take charge of it. The District Visitors will be able to obtain any information from Mrs. Schön, and all subscriptions for the Charity should be paid to her.

A very kind contributor has given an excellent seat for the Churchyard, which it is intended should be used by those who come to visit the graves of their friends. Two handsome prayer books for the Clergy Prayer Desks have been given by a member of the congregation. I am extremely sorry to say that on Saturday, the 20th, one of these was stolen from the Church.

The subscriptions for the Day Schools are now due, and will very shortly be collected by Miss Barnard, or they may be sent to me, or to Mr. Joseph, at Rocdene.
