MY DEAR FRIENDS,

The first matter to which I wish to direct your attention is the RE-BUILDING OF THE ORGAN. It was an old instrument when it was erected in St. James's Church, and is now very much out of date in some important particulars. We understand that there is a great deal of material in it which can be used in the re-building, and that it can be made into a very good and up-to-date instrument, with pneumatic action and electric blower, for the sum of about £420. Before giving the order for the carrying out of the work, we feel that we ought to know to what extent we may count upon the support of the members of the Congregation. And so we are making an appeal for promises of subscriptions to be paid about June 1st. We have received one kind promise of £50; and another member of the congregation has promised £10 if nine others will do the same, and we have already received two or three promises towards this.

It is some years since we had to make a special appeal for the Church for any cosiderable amount, and I venture to hope that there will be a general and generous response to this.

I have no doubt that everybody will wish to avoid a Sale of Work or Bazaar if possible. It would be very delightful if the whole of the money could be raised by direct gifts.

I feel sure that when the work is done, the increased beauty of the services will be a full compensation for the outlay. The promises should, if possible, be sent or given to either of the Churchwardens or to me by the 10th inst.

I am glad to say that the CONCERT for the NURSE FUND proved to be a greater success than we had anticipated: after the payment of all expenses, £17 10s. 0d. has been added to the Fund. This is most satisfactory, and we are very grateful to the Committee who arranged the Concert; to the performers who so efficiently helped, and to all who assisted in selling tickets and in providing refreshments for those who took part.

There was a CHURCH PARADE at St. James's for the local companies of the Church Lads' Brigade on Sunday, the 18th ult. About 200 lads were present with their officers, and they looked very nice and soldier like. I am glad to say our own Company has greatly improved in number lately.

Mr. Basey has become an officer, and he is giving most valuable help. There is to be a prize giving on Friday, the 8th inst. in the Boys' School.

An excellent Lecture was given in connection with the C.E.M.S., on Persia, by Mr. Allinson of St. Margaret's, on the 20th ult, and those who were present enjoyed a great treat. At the Men's Service on the 25th ult., the attendance was good, but a number of members were not there. We should like to have their whole-hearted support.

There was a Distribution of Prizes to the DAY SCHOOL Children on the 23rd ult. Mrs. Garrett very kindly handed the Children their rewards. There was a large attendance of parents, and a very happy afternoon was spent. The teachers are to be congratulated upon the degree of efficiency that the Schools have reached.

There will be a Service for the members of the MOTHERS' UNION on Wednesday, the 6th inst., at 3 p.m., when the address will be given by the Rev. E. E. Charles, the new Vicar of Hampton Will all members try to be present, and will they remember that they all are invited to the Holy Communion at 11 a.m. on the 25th inst.?
