MY DEAR FRIENDS,

Practically all the Church Accounts are printed below, and I am sure that our readers will agree that the total is a very good sum. It is considerably larger than we have ever raised before in one year during the last twenty years. I should like to express my deep gratitude to all who have helped us in any way. I am specially thankful to those who have acted as Secretaries or who have collected subscriptions for any of the objects named. I am indebted to Mr. C. H. Evans and to Mr. C. H. Carpenter for very kindly auditing the various accounts. We must not forget to thank God for the liberality which has been shewn.

At the VESTRY MEETING held in April the desire was expressed that some suitable memorial should be put up in the Church to the memory of the late Mrs. FitzWygram, and also to the late Miss Barnard, and I am now able to say that this desire has been very considerably advanced. It has been decided to place two stained glass windows in the Baptistery, in memory of Mrs. FitzWygram, the cost of one has been undertaken by Mrs. FitzWygram's relations, and the other is to be borne by the parishioners and friends. A third window will be erected to the memory of the former Vicar, the Hon. and Rev. Henry Bligh, for which Mrs. Bligh and Mr. Edward Bligh have become responsible. Mr. Stutchbury has kindly consented to act as treasurer for the parishioners' contributions, and Mrs. Powell and Miss Butler have been collecting subscriptions. Two-thirds of the money required has already been subscribed. Further sums should be sent, with as little delay as possible, to Mr. Stutchbury or to me. The sums received vary from one shilling to two guineas. If the amount received is more than is required for the window, some other object will

be chosen upon which to expend it. The order for the three windows has been placed with Messrs. Shrigley & Hunt, of Lancaster, and it is hoped that the work will be completed by St. James' Day, July 25th. The names of all the subscribers will be printed, but not the amounts given. The form of memorial to Miss Barnard has not yet been decided upon, but Miss Lambert, of Cranmer road, has kindly consented to act as Treasurer, and any contributions may be sent direct to her or to me, or paid through the District Visitors. Any sums, however small, may be given. No doubt a large number of people will wish to have a share in the memorial.

The date of the FANCY FAIR will very soon be here. I am glad to say that through the painstaking care and work of Mr. Lowdell, the arrangements are now in a very forward state, upwards of one hundred helpers have kindly promised to assist at the stalls or to help in some way, and contributions are coming in fairly well. Gifts for the Sale will be most thankfully received at the Vicarage, or by any of the Stallholders. Bills announcing the Fair are already out, and I hope everybody will observe the days and show their interest by their presence. Tickets for admission are in the hands of District Visitors and others, and friends are invited to purchase at once. For the opening, to be performed by the HON. C. T. MILLS, M.P., the tickets will be one shilling; after 4.30 p.m., sixpence. On the second day the admission will be sixpence from 2.30 to 5 p.m., after that time threepence will be charged, and this will be returned in the purchases made. In addition to Plain and Fancy Work, there will be a Choir Stall of Household requisites; Sunday School Stall; Sweets; Crochet Work and Dolls; Workbags; Books and General; Plants and Flowers; Strawberries and Cream, and Refreshments for all reasonable requirements; a Bran Tub and also a Village Pump. The Baby Show

previously announced was found to present too many difficulties and so will be omitted. But there will be no lack of amusements, Mr. and Mrs. Chester, so well known already, have promised to give us Entertainments; Mrs. Doll and Mr. Gilberthorpe are getting up others, while Mrs. Alice King-Stephens has promised a most charming little play called "The French Governess," which will be given on the lawn. The well known champion Handbell Ringers from Walton will give performances. We are to have Cocoa Nut Shies, Golf Competitions, Hat Trimming, and other works of skill, the latter under the care of Dr. Dashwood Howard.

The BAND OF HOPE COMPETITIONS for this Rural Deanery on April 26th resulted in our representatives winning the Junior Shield, thanks to the great pains taken by Mr. Basey and our other helpers.

By an inadvertence, the name of Mr. Lovell was omitted from the list of sidesmen elected at the Easter Vestry Meeting.

I am requested to mention that June 12th will be Pound Day at the St. Catherine's Home, Teddington, and to say that any contributions will be thankfully received.
