MY DEAR FRIENDS,

I little thought that my next letter to you would be written under such sad circumstances, and it is a real sorrow to us that we are not back with you to share in the Services of Intercession and to cheer up those who in many ways are sufferers by this disastrous war.

We have had several letters respecting relief funds which will have to be raised during the coming winter. Most of them suggest that we in Hampton Hill should be responsible for our own needy ones, and I am inclined to agree to this: nothing, however, should be hurriedly decided upon. The multiplication of relief funds is not only a weakness, but a real danger at a time of stress. A meeting will be called, probably about the middle of September, to discuss the position of affairs, meanwhile the existing organizations seem quite able to meet existing distress. It seems likely, if the war continues long, that the whole community will greatly suffer, and that help will have to be given to the many who will suffer *indirectly* through the war, and for whom no relief—except that of the Poor Law—is now available; it is for these that we shall have to provide, and perhaps extensively.

It was a great pleasure to us welcoming so many of our Parishioners and friends at St. James' Day treat, and we are very grateful to all those—teachers and others—who gave their assistance with the children.

I fear the Missionary Exhibition to which many of us were looking forward must be indefinitely postponed.

The Daily Services will be resumed on Monday, September 14th, and after that date, Special Intercession Services will be held, of which due notice will be given.

Miss Foy, who has left the Girls' School to enter the Training College at New Cross, carries with her the good wishes of the children and her fellow teachers, who presented her with a Fountain Pen, as a token of their good-will towards her.
