MY DEAR PEOPLE,

It is difficult to think or write of anything except this sad and awful war, but still our ordinary Parochial work must be carried on "as usual."

The members of the C. L. B. have been busy collecting old newspapers, etc., to be sold for the War Funds, and they are now ready to collect blankets for the recruits.

I was glad to see the quantities of work undertaken by the School girls for the Soldiers, particulars of which appear elsewhere; the members of Miss Butler's Mothers' Meeting have also been very busy and have contributed many useful articles.

I understand that after October 1st, all military cases of relief will be dealt with by Miss Butler in connection with the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families' Association, and that the Local Aid Fund will be used to assist those who are suffering indirectly through the war. I am glad there was such a generous response to the S. and S. F. A. collections, the whole of which—rather more than \$28—was returned to Miss Butler for the relief of local cases.

The list of those who are actively serving in some branch of His Majesty's Service contains more than a 100 names, and hangs in the Church porch. From October 1st, until the war ends, the Church bell will ring for a short time at 12 (noon), when I hope you will remember in your prayers "the King and all in authority, our sailors, soldiers, the suffering, the anxious and the sorrowful."

The Harvest Thanksgiving Services will take place on Sunday, October 11th. Offerings of fruit, flowers, etc., should be sent to the Church as early as possible on Saturday, the 10th.

The Band of Hope will begin its work with a Service in Church on October 12th, at 6 p.m., and

an Entertainment will be given by the children on the 19th, when Mrs. Coad Pryor will distribute the medals, certificates, etc., won in the competitions during the last session; a vigorous scheme of work for the winter has been arranged.

I shall be most grateful to hear of anyone willing to undertake the work of District Visitor. There are two vacancies, and one or two Teachers are wanted in the Sunday School.

WAIFS' AND STRAYS' SOCIETY. Annual Inspection of St. Arsula's Girls' Industrial School, Teddington, The following extracts from the report will interest many of our readers:—

"Reading and recitation are delivered with care and intelligence, and composition in all classes is good. Geography has been well taught, and the girls give their answers briskly and intelligently. Singing is taught by both notations, and songs were rendered sweetly and with care. Needlework is taught in the school, cutting out by scale, and some really good sewing and knitting have been done. No girls have yet left since the school opened, but all are being prepared for domestic service, and receiving training in every department. Free physical exercises are practised each morning, and drill and games are thoroughly enjoyed. This little school is doing an excellent work. In manner the girls in this school may be classed among the brightest and happiest of those in the industrial schools of the country."
