MY DEAR PEOPLE,

The old year has nearly gone, and we shall soon be opening another page in life's book. Most heartily do I wish you all every happiness in the New Year, and we must pray that during its course a "righteous and lasting peace" may be restored.

The Archbishops have set apart the first Sunday in the New Year as a day of Special Intercessions on behalf of the War. The forms of service issued by Authority will be used at the 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. services. I have been approached as to the possibility of a united service to be held in the afternoon, when all Christian people in the Parish could meet together in their Parish Church. I am glad to say that Mr. Shrewsbury and Mr. Sellars, representing the Nonconformists, are heartly in sympathy with the idea. The service will begin at 4.15, and finish at 5 p.m.

It was a great joy meeting so many of you at our various Celebrations on Xmas Day. The Church was beautifully adorned by the usual band of willing helpers. The collections, amounting to over £12, will be distributed in coals, &c., among the widows and poor. Six o'clock is evidently not a suitable hour for the evening Carol Service, as the attendance was very small, though the Carols were nicely rendered by the choir boys.

The Annual Collections for the Society for Propagating the Gospel will be made on January 17th, when the Preacher will be the Venerable Archdeacon Lefroy, formerly of Perth. We are sending Army and Navy abroad in this time of war with prayers and blessings, but the Church is always engaged in sending the Lord's soldiers abroad, women as well as men, with prayers, and we assure them that they will never be forgotten. Now the test has come for us, and we must not forsake these men and women who are in our Church's firing line.

Mr. Lees, of the Missions to Seamen, has kindly consented to give one of his Lantern Lectures on

his work, to the Crusaders, on Monday. January 25th, in the Church Room. Others, besides Crusaders, will be welcomed.

Mr. Whalley, Clerical Secretary of the Waifs' and Strays' Society, is coming to tell the C.E.M.S. something more about his work. He is bringing some slides, so a very interesting evening may be looked for. The date is January 26th, in the Church Room, at 820 p.m.

The C.E.T.S. Social Gathering proved an immense success. The Schoolroom was quite well filled, and everyone spent a very enjoyable evening. I am very grateful to all those who contributed in various ways to such a pleasant gathering.
