When the war is over the number of Soldiers who will no longer be able to follow their ordinary occupation will, it is feared, be very great. I can think of no better memorial to the late Lord Roberts, than the scheme which has been inaugurated to meet this need when it comes. It is proposed to erect large workshops in London and Aldershot, and probably at other large centres, where disabled men of both Army and Navy will be taught such trades as they may be able to learn. This plan has the warm approval of Lord Roberts' family; I commend it heartily to your support. Donations may be sent to Miss Butler, S. James' Road.
