My Dear People,

I am pleased to say that S. James' maintains its high position in the Deanery in connection with Missionary Work of the Church. Last year, we were asked to contribute f_{62} as our parochial quota, but we succeeded in sending £118-nearly double. I hope we shall do even better this year. Towards this satisfactory result the Missionary Working Party largely contributes. Its first meeting takes place on Friday, October 3rd, at Mrs. Mason's, Eton Lodge, when the old and new members will be heartily welcomed. The C.M.S. branch of the work suffers a severe loss by the removal of Mrs. Kiddell from the neighbourhood; she has done great things for the cause of missions, and we regret her departure and wish her God-speed in her new home.

We have just lost, also by removal from the Parish, a very old member of the Choir, Mr. R. Simpson, who, for nearly 40 years, was a chorister at S. James' and was held in great esteem by us all.

An innovation will soon take place in the Choir. For some considerable time there has been great difficulty in obtaining Alto voices, it has now been decided, and I very heartily concur, to ask half a dozen ladies to help. I believe Mr. Russe has already secured the services of four, and he will be glad to receive the names of any who are willing to help in this very important branch of the Church Services.

The Winter Temperance work begins in October. The SENIOR branch will hold its first meeting in the Church Room on Friday, October 10th, at 8 p.m., when Mr. G. T. Wood, of Balham, will be the speaker. The BAND OF HOPE will meet in the Boys' School on Monday, October 13th, at 6 p.m. The number of members is limited to 150, and no child under 7, unless already a member, can be admitted. The medals, etc., for last year will be presented at a service in Church on Monday, October 20th, at 6 p.m.

The Harvest Thanksgiving Services will take place on Sunday, October 12th. The collections will be in aid of the Teddington Cottage Hospital. Gifts of fruit, flowers, etc., will be gladly received and should be brought to the Church before 10 a.m. on Saturday, October 11th.

A Meeting was held in the Church Room on Thursday, September 18th, at which it was decided to arrange gatherings to welcome the demobilised soldiers. These will be held in the Boys' School on Monday and Tuesday, October 27th and 28th. There will be music, refreshments and smokes! I hope that every man or lad who has served his country and been spared to return to us, will give us an opportunity of showing that we appreciate what has been done for us.

I gladly welcome Mrs. C. Knight as a new District Visitor in place of Mrs. Tandy, who, to the regret of all of us, has had to give up her work, at any rate for a time, owing to ill-health. I am also glad to say that Miss Paine has consented to help Miss Jordan in the Infants' Sunday School.

The Girl Guides have secured a new Captain to succeed Mrs. Meynell. Miss Cockburn, of 15, Park Road, has kindly undertaken the work, and I hope all the helpers will rally round and give her loyal support, so that the Hampton Hill Company will continue to flourish.

You will all be interested to hear that Mr. Goldie has now been demobilised, and has taken up his work at Christ Church, Gipsy Hill. He will carry with him our prayers and hearty good wishes.

I hope soon to be able to make a definite announcement in connection with our "War Memorial."
