The Enabling Bill, passed by a 300 majority in the House of Commons, has given the Church powers of self-government long wished for. I shall be calling a meeting of the congregation some day in February, when I hope to lay before you particulars as to these altered conditions.

As our Bishop has recently said "But when all is said and done, it is the spirit of man in which the secret of all reform really lies; the Hope of the future lies in a spiritual change. What we all want is a change of heart, a change of outlook, a new "mind," and the Church exists to secure that this new mind is the "Mind of Christ."

You will find elsewhere in this month's magazine suggestions for Thanksgiving and Intercessions, which I hope you will use in your private devotions; they can also be in our minds at Celebrations; it is a great bond to feel that we are all praying for the same objects, in addition to our own special and personal requests.

I am printing the final-list of those whose names are to be inscribed on our War Memorial, I trust it is complete and correct. Miss Brewer has taken great pains to make it so, and we are all much indebted to her for her care in the matter.

I am sorry that we had to miss the Special Service for young people on January 25th, but Mr. Basey's illness, from which we are all glad to hear he is recovering, made it impossible to have the parade of the C.I.B. on that day; there will, however, be a Service in S. James, for the whole Battalion on Sunday, February 8th, at 3.45 p.m.

The Band of Hope members are having their "Xmas" treat on Saturday, February 7th, at 6 p.m. I am much indebted to those kind friends who have sent me donations towards the expenses.

I shall be glad to receive any letters for Hospitals, other than the Teddington Cottage Hospital, I have an ample supply of the latter.
