My DEAR PEOPLE,

Wednesday, May 26th, will long live in the memories of those who took part in the impressive service of unveiling the War Memorial; the Bishop's address, the singing, the quiet sad thankfulness of the occasion all contributed to make it a real "Red Letter" day in the Parish. The arrangements were carried out with a restful reverence which we must all have felt. Α word of thanks is due to Mr. Makepeace for the careful preparation of the "Form of Service," containing the names of those "whose death of honour" we were commemorating, and to Messrs. Keates & Co., for the excellent manner in which the whole work has been carried out. All the accounts in connection with the Memorial have been paid, but it has been thought necessary to erect a low fence round it, which will consist of 16 short posts of Clipsham Stone and an ornamental chain; this, it is hoped, will protect the grass, etc. The additional cost of the posts will be  $f_{24}$ , and the Committee will be glad to receive gifts to defray this cost. Arrangements are being made by which someone will be always responsible for the removal of dead flowers and keeping the whole enclosure in a tidy state.

A large expenditure has been rendered necessary on the external fabric of the Church, specially the re-pointing of portions of the tower. A special appeal will shortly be made by the Churchwardens to defray this, and I hope it will meet with a generous response.

The annual open-air C.E.T.S. gathering will be held on Wednesday, July 21st, at 7.30, in the Vicarage field. A very attractive programme is being arranged, and light refreshments will also be provided. Tickets 6d. each.

Chipperfield, Jordan, Lowdell and Tandy, was chosen to make enquiries respecting the possibility of erecting a parish room, the want of which is much felt. It was decided to meet quarterly, and Messrs. Jakeman, Russe and Shelbourne were co-opted as members of the Council. The Vicar was asked to make enquiries about a "Bier" for use at funerals.
