MY DEAR PEOPLE,

You will find elsewhere the suggested scheme of Intercession at the 7.30 a.m. daily Celebration of the Holy Communion which commences on Thursday, September 1st. I make a very earnest appeal to all who are in any way associated with the various parochial organizations that each day will find one of their number present. I am sure that in this way untold blessing will fall on both workers and work. I have already received requests for special Intercession, and shall always be glad to receive such if they are left in the Vicarage letter box, or handed to me.

I fear that we are to be faced with a considerable outlay on the Organ. The builders of the instrument say that it wants thoroughly overhauling. It is possible, they say, that the great heat has had something to do with causing the trouble, but the matter will receive immediate attention. The music in the Church is now so good that it must not be handicapped by a faulty organ.

The children attending the Sunday Schools, about 300, will have their annual treat this year in the Vicarage Grounds on August 27th. The Prizes will be given away at 4.30, and there will be sports in the evening. A very cordial invitation is given to the children's parents to be present from 4.30 onwards. I anticipate that the cost will be about £15, and towards this I shall be glad to receive donations; gifts "in kind" will also be welcomed.

The annual out-door Gathering of the C.E.T.S. will take place in the Vicarage Garden at 7.30 on Wednesday, August 10th. Tickets are 6d. each, and include an excellent Entertainment and light refreshments.

We were glad to welcome the Chairman of the

Middlesex County Council, Alderman De Salis, as special preacher on Diocesan Sunday, July 10th, when the offertories amounted to  $\pounds_{17}$  178. 6d.

You will all be glad to hear that the interior of the Day Schools will be thoroughly cleaned and re-decorated during the summer holidays.

CHURCH LADS' BRIGADE .- Annual Official Inspection, July 6th, 1921. The Officer in Command of the Parade on Wednesday, July 6th, would wish to express to all ranks his appreciation and thanks for the remarkably fine turn out. The Inspection of the ranks showed that attention had been given to those necessary details of dress, without which no parade can be a decided success. The steadiness of all ranks during inspection was highly commendable, and very favourably reported upon by the Inspecting Officer. Another feature which arrested the attention of the Inspecting Officer was the fine display of Bible Class and Long Service Medals-the lads who can display these are to be highly congratulated, for it means long and strenuous service. The combined drill movements (without rehearsal) served to show that the work performed during the season by the Companies in their own drill halls had been done efficiently and well, and all ranks are to be highly congratulated on the success with which they accomplished them. The difficult movement of "Advance în Review Order" was a very marked success. The march past was steady, and the ranks were kept well closed up; the saluting generally was excellent. The exhibition of Training which followed was expeditiously done and without confusion, and the Inspecting Officer was very much struck with its variety and general efficiency. The two bands did their share of the evening's work in fine style, and showed that the reputation they had gained elsewhere is thoroughly deserved. The Inspecting Officer's Report to the War Office is believed to be extremely satisfactory. Altogether one felt proud of having command of such a Parade and each Officer is asked to convey to all ranks under their command the C.O.'s appreciation and thanks.

JUNIOR CORPS.—The Juniors struck one by their enthusiasm and keenness. Their appearance was good, and their steadiness during the inspection admirable. The Inspecting Officer was much struck by the number of silver stars worn. The march past was very good, the step being well kept, the ranks properly closed, and the salute to the Inspecting Officer excellent. The band which headed them deserves especial commendation. Will each Officer in charge of Juniors convey to them the C.O.'s expression of pleasure at their smartness, keenness and enthusiasm.
