MY DEAR PEOPLE,

Armistice Day falls on Friday, November 11th. There will be the usual celebration at 7.30, and an additional Service at 10 a.m., to provide an opportunity for those who would wish to make their Communion that day, but for whom the earlier hour would be inconvenient. There will also be a special "**Memorial Service**" at 8 p.m., to which parents and friends of our "Heroes" are invited. There is a small sum remaining to be paid for putting the chain and posts round the War Memorial, and the offertories on this day will be given to the War Memorial Fund.

November will be a fateful month for the whole world. The Conference on "Armaments," to be held at Washington, may mark a new era for Christian Civilization. Prayers will be offered in Church, and I ask you earnestly to pray, privately, that the work of the Conference may be productive of a real and lasting release from the tyranny of physical force in the shape of "shot and shell."

Many of the parochial funds are helped each year by a "Jumble Sale." The date this year is Wednesday, November 9th, I hope you will get rid of as much "Jumble" as possible; nothing comes amiss apparently to this sale.

You will see elsewhere the result of the Annual Sale for Missions over-seas, it was quite excellent.

We are much obliged to all those parishioners who sent gifts to the Church for the Harvest Festival on October 9th. The Church was beautifully decorated; the music very good, and the collections for Hospitals just over £17. The fruit, etc., this year went to the Isolation Hospital, and was much appreciated.

The next Social takes place on Friday, November 4th, at 7.30. I am sorry that so many were unable to get into the Schools at the last Social, but all the tickets are sold beforehand, and the space prevents our having more than 150 present. I hear that there is a capital programme for next time.

I cordially commend to your support a concert organised by Miss W. Newman, of Seymour Road, on behalf of the Orphan Girls' Home. The date is Wednesday, November 2nd, and tickets may be obtained of Miss Newman.

The next C.E.T.S. Meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 15th, in the Church Room, at 8 p.m., when the Rev. J. Victor Reade will give an address.

SALE OF WORK FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Annual Missionary Sale, the outcome of the meetings of the Missionary Working Party, took place on Wednesday, October 19th, in the Girls' Schools. The Church Room has long been found too small, and it was a distinct advantage to have more space, and to be able to make a better display of the goods on the stalls. Mrs. Elliott very kindly opened the Sale at 3 o'clock, the Vicar presiding over a good attendance. The Stalls were as follows: Work Stall—Mrs. Gascoyne, Mrs. Kestin and Mrs. Tandy. "White Elephant" Stall—Mrs. Stevens and Miss Wildish. Plants and Flowers—Mrs. and Miss Anthony. Toys—Miss M. Anthony. Cakes, etc.—Miss Brewer and Miss M. Wildish. Bran Tub—Miss K. Shelbourn, Miss D. Seward, the Misses M. and L. Morton. An excellent tea was served under the supervision of Mrs. Joseph, Mrs. Carpenter and Mrs. Shelbourn. During the afternoon there was an Entertainment by 22 of the Sunday School Girls. Miss Lush had arranged a pretty display of drill and skipping, and there were also action songs and recitations. So successful was this entertainment that it was given twice during the afternoon. After paying expenses, the

sum realized up-to-date is £61 15s. 6d. As there is still some more money to come in, it is hoped that the total amount will not be far short of £70. We are very grateful to all our friends for their hearty support of this effort for the cause of Missions Over-seas, to those who came and bought so generously, as well as to those who worked so hard beforehand to bring about so excellent a result.

DAY OF INTERCESSIONS FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS.

In accordance with the custom of the Church, S. Andrew's Day, Wednesday, November 30th, will be observed as a day of Intercession for the Church's Work Over-seas. The day will be divided into portions of half-an-hour, and a paper will be put in the porch of the Church for the names of those who will be responsible for undertaking these half-hours.
