The Choir sang beautifully Sullivan's "Brother, thou art gone before us." The collection went a good way towards defraying the cost of the posts, &c. around the War Memorial.

May I call your attention to the notice which appears elsewhere respecting the proposed Memorial to Mr. Job? I feel sure it needs noword of mine to commend it to your generous support.

Last year quite a nice sum was contributed on Christmas Day in the "Waifs' and Strays" envelopes; a supply will be put in Church on Sunday, the 18th, and they can be placed in the box for the purpose on Christmas Day at any of the Services.

CHURCH LADS' BRIGADE.—Wednesday, November 9th, will long be remembered by those who were assembled in Westminster Abbey. occasion being the Dedication of a Banner in memory of those members of the Church Lads' Brigade who gave their lives for their King and Country during the Great War. Unfortunately, the massing of the Brigades on the Horse Guards' Parade and the march past the Cenotaph had to be abandoned, owing to the thick fog which enveloped the City. The Abbey was filled to its utmost capacity. The Nave was reserved for the London Division, the other parts being filled with representatives from other parts of the country. The Londoners, to their great regret, were unable to see the Dedication or hear a word of the sermon, but bore their disappointment with Christian fortitude. We had a splendid view of the lovely banner in the Grand Procession, which took nearly half-an-hour to encompass the Grand Old Abbey. The singing of the hymns was very hearty, the Choir gave of their best, the unaccompanied verses being very impressive. The Service concluded with the "Last Post," sounded by four buglers. As we filed out, we passed by the "Unknown Warrior's Tomb," and the thoughts of many were "What can we do to make our Country worthy of the Heroes who laid down their lives in the Great War."
