The Bishop's Call to a Week of Prayer and Self-Denial.

NOVEMBER 19th-26th.

The Bishop of the Diocese has fixed a week in November (19th—26th) for United Prayer and Self-Denial in every Parish in the Diocese. This call from our Leader is one to which all Churchmen will desire to respond. Fuller details will be given later, and literature provided. What we need now is a clear idea why this effort has been launched, and what it aims to accomplish. These two questions are answered in a leaflet headed "A Call," from which the following quotation is taken :— "WHY? Because the personal standards of Service and Sacrifice prevalent among Churchmen are not adequate to maintain and extend Christ's Kingdom."

WHAT IS IT FOR? (a) To realise by more faithful prayer such a vision of Our Need of God and God's Need of Us as His fellow labourers as shall issue in a *permanently* Higher Standard of Christian Service.

(b) To provide, at once, by special Acts of Self Sacrifice voluntarily undertaken during one week, the extra money immediately needed.

Every parish needs workers. The Diocese needs money to pay its Clergy. The Central Church Fund needs money to train Clergy and Teachers in Church Day Schools. But most of all we need a New Spirit of Service and Sacrifice. Given this, all the workers and money needed will be forthcoming. It is that we may receive such a spirit from God that we are summoned by our Bishop to draw near to God with hearts opened by Denial of Self.

The Bishop is himself devoting a week in October to preparation for the Week. He will issue the call to Churchmen and women at various centres as follows :---

- Islington Parish Church-October 9th, at 8 p.m.
- St. Martin's-in-the-Fields—October 10th, at 6.15 p.m.
- St. Mary Abbot's-October 11th, at 8 p.m.
- St. Pancras-October 14th, time to be arranged.

The People's Palace-November 6th, at 8 p.m. Great rally of East London Church Folk.

The Week's effort will find its climax in a United Service of Thanksgiving and Dedication in St. Paul's Cathedral, at 5.30 p.m., on December 2nd. At this service every Parish will, through its appointed officer, make offering of the Self-Denial gifts to the Bishop, who will present them at the Altar for dedication to God.
