THE MOTHERS' UNION.

Mrs. Wilberforce, for some years Central President of the Mothers' Union, and formerly President for London Diocese, has been unanimously elected Vice-President for life on the London Diocesan Council in place of the late Lady Horatia Erskine.

The Mothers' Union, through its branches, is working hard to support Sir Thomas Bennett's efforts for a cleaner press, and petitions are being extensively signed.

A Mass Meeting for Women is to be held on December 4th, at 3 p.m., at the People's Palace, Mile End, E. This is especially intended for the members in the following seven Deaneries: Stepney, Poplar, Shoreditch, Bethnal Green, Hackney and Stoke Newington, Islington, East and West City. The Bishop of Stepney has kindly promised to be present. The speaker will be Mrs. Hubert Barclay, Central President of the Mothers' Union. The chair will be taken by Mrs. Hudson Lyall, C.B.E., L.C.C., President for the London Diocese.

Mrs. Lyall hopes every member in that part of London will do her best to make this meeting a great success by making it well known.

LONDON DIOCESAN FUND.

The Diocesan Estimates for 1923 were approved by the Conference on October 30th. The Deaneries have already received information of the sum apportioned, and the Parishes will in due course receive from the Deanery Officers information as to the Quota for the year. The Diocesan Conference was held a month earlier than in previous years, in order that each Parochial Church Council might have this information in time to include it in the Parochial Estimates.

The preparation of these estimates will now be occupying the attention of the Councils, and it is therefore opportune to draw their attention to the Resolution passed by the Council of the Fund early in the year:—

"That every Parochial Church Council be urged to regard the Quota as a minimum offering of the Parish to the Diocese, to include it in the Parochial Budget, and to make arrangements for its payment as a corporate responsibility of the Parish, in quarterly instalments; and further, to invite members of the congregation to subscribe as individuals outside the Quota towards the £40,000 new income required."

The important words in the Resolution are: -

(1) A Minimum Offering. How necessary it is to remember this will be clear from the fact that out of a total need for 1923 of \pounds 96,250, only \pounds 54,851 has for that year been apportioned among the Parishes. So that even if every Parish were to contribute the full Quota, we should only receive from that source little more than half the money needed for the year. It has more than once been suggested that a very much larger sum should be placed upon the Quota. While, however, there are still more than 200 parishes unable. even after real effort in many cases, to raise the present Quota, it does not seem opportune to increase the burden lest it should unduly discourage those parishes which are just succeeding for the first time to achieve their ambition. The past few years have shown a steady growth of loyalty to the Quota. The present remedy, then, seems to be for parishes to regard the present Quota as a minimum, which it should be a matter of pride to exceed.

(2) A Corporate Responsibility. Many Parishes which have adopted the New Way in Church Finance, and budget for total needs of the Parish, including the Diocesan Quota, already acknowledge this. Quarter by quarter a cheque is drawn for the proportion of the Quota, in the same way as other quarterly cheques for stipends, wages, etc.

The Annual Sale of Work for Foreign and Colonial Missions was held on Tuesday, October 24th, in the Girls' School. Lady Pilditch, who kindly opened the Sale at 3 o'clock, made purchases from the various stalls. We were very glad the Vicar was able to be there, though for only a short time. The attendance was rather below the average, but we thank those who came for the generous support they gave. Stalls were as follows :-- Work Stall-Mrs. Tandy, Mrs. Kestin, Mrs. Anthony and Mrs. Gascoyne. Cakes, etc.-Mrs. Knight and Mrs. Evans. Butterfly Stall-Miss Anthony. Bran Tub-Miss Amy Daines. "White Elephant" Stall-Mrs. Stevens. Punch and Judy Show-Mr. Chaplin for Mrs. Joseph. A very good tea was served under the supervision of Mrs. Joseph, Mrs. Carpenter and Mrs. Shelbourn. Mrs. Boughton sold Tea Tickets. Miss Monica Roberts and Miss Frances Leete carried trays of small toys, and disposed of a goodly number. A beautifully dressed doll was given by Mrs. Player, which realised f_2 , in the capable hands of Miss M. Anthony. Miss Lush, as usual, gave very successful entertainments by the School Girls. The Members of the Missionary Working Party are to be congratulated on their efforts, which have so far resulted in the sum of f.62 6s. 11d. There is still some money to come in, and expenses total only f_2 8s. gd.
