### Parish News.

**THE FETE.**—A very successful Fête was held in the Vicarage Grounds on July 18th. The weather proved favourable and there was a large gathering of people. Sir Cecil Domville, Bart., who came to open the Fête, laid stress upon the importance of Church Schools. Before he left he paid a visit to the various stalls and side shows. This year a Flower stall, a Pound stall, and a few new side shows, added to the attraction of the entertainment. Two very excellent concerts were arranged for the afternoon which drew quite good audiences. The "Blue Birds" gave one of their characteristic entertainments in the evening which was much appreciated by the crowd that gathered round to hear them. Houp-la, Cokernut-shies, Quoits, Klondyke, Aunt Sally,

and the Post Box, attracted their patrons, while the youngsters enjoyed a Punch and Judy entertainment, the fish pond and donkey rides. Dancing in the enclosure brought to a conclusion a most enjoyable day. It is hoped that the Day Schools will derive substantial financial benefit from the proceeds.

**PARISH NURSE.**—A meeting was held last month at the Vicarage to discuss the possibility of having a District Nurse for the Parish. The probable cost was estimated to be about £160 per annum. It was decided to canvas the Parish from house to house to solicit donations for this year, and promises of annual subscriptions for the future. If the donations warrant it, the services of a Nurse will be secured by the Autumn. Patients will be expected to give a trifle, according to their circumstances, for services rendered, though, of course, those unable to contribute will be attended free. The Nurse will not attend Midwifery cases. Please have your donations ready for the member of the Committee who calls upon you, and when going out leave it with somebody to hand over and so avoid the necessity of calling again.

**THE MEMORIAL TO THE LATE REV. R. COAD-PRYOR.**—Since the meeting of subscribers held in the Church Room last month, it has been ascertained that Mr. Eric Coad-Pryor anticipates erecting a tombstone over his Father's grave. Another meeting of subscribers was called to discuss further the form the memorial shall take, the result of which meeting was not available at the time of going to print.

The Daily Celebration of the Holy Communion will be discontinued during August.

**INTER-SCHOOL SPORTS.**—Great success attended the efforts of the Boys' School at the recent Inter-School Sports. After many years of striving they succeeded in winning the Championship Shield, as well as again winning the Handicap Shield for the third time. Further honour was

obtained for the School by C. Cartlidge, who scored the maximum number of points possible for any individual competitor, and became Champion Boy for the second time in three years. It is certainly a great achievement, and is made more so by the fact that the School has only about half the number of scholars that some others of the competing Schools contain. Keeness was the keynote of the success. Practically 90 per cent. of the scholars took part in the early trials, and the School was represented on the Sports ground by nearly 30 per cent. of its boys, a greater proportion than was sent in by any other School. Every boy did his best to second the efforts of the teachers during the training. Messages of congratulations were received from the Board of Managers, and from neighbouring Schools, and were read to the boys.
