My DEAR PEOPLE, Samuel sold votos

We are entering upon a year that may prove to be the most important since the War. A year full of events, the results of which may have a far reaching effect upon the international and domestic history of our country. At the moment there is a strong sense of insecurity about which is causing much anxiety amongst the leaders of the different departments of life in our land. We have been trying since 1918 to procure real peace amongst the nations and the various industrial concerns at home, but up to the present with little success. Whatever singleparty Government is in power its life will be short, too short to bring any material benefit to the country. What then is the remedy for our present distress? It is worthy of note that a lady member of Parliament has said that "the moral, spiritual and domestic forces of this country are becoming more powerful every day." If this be true, as true I believe it to be, then we have cause for hope. It seems to me to confirm my conviction that the one remedy for the state of things to-day is a national return to God. Repentance for our past neglect of Him and prayer for His help and guidance in our present difficulties should claim our special attention. A wonderful opportunity is given to the Church and all other Christian Bodies for establishing their faith in the absolute supremacy of the King of Kings, and for proclaiming the Christian religion as the only source of security. Let us take as our motto for 1924 this passage from the fiftyfifth Psalm: "Cast thy burden upon the Lord and He will sustain thee."

Two matters call for the attention of the Church

people of this Parish just now. The one is the Assessment Scheme, and the other is the Electoral Roll. We have come to the end of a financial year, the one outstanding feature is the success of the Assessment Scheme. It is admitted by all who have to deal with Church finance that under present conditions such a scheme is necessary, as it is the only way of securing from people who are not as regular at their worship as they might be, their proper share towards the up-keep of their church and its services. The ideal we aim at is that all who make use of the Church for any spiritual purpose whatever, whether it is merely for the christening of their children, the visiting of their sick, or the burying of their dear departed, should give their financial support by assessing themselves according to their means. For Churchgoers the scheme gives opportunity for regular and systematic giving, and when permanently established will do away with the necessity of reminding them of their obligations by constantly asking them for contributions towards this, that and the other fund. The scheme in its ideal embraces the maintenance of the church and the services, the Curate's stipend, the up-keep of the Churchyard, and the running of such organisations as the Sunday School, the Band of Hope, the Church Lads' Brigade, and scripture prizes for the Day Schools. In next month's magazine a budget for 1924 will appear. I hope that all who have joined the Assessment Scheme will continue their Assessment, and that many more will join this year.

Some time ago we distributed forms for placing those on the Electoral Roll who are not yet enrolled. Only a few forms have been returned. We should be glad to have the others as soon as possible because we are asked to complete our Roll by March next. As the proportion of representatives for the Diocese in the National
