My DEAR PEOPLE,

We are suffering a little from the habit which the increased facilities for travel and pleasure on Sunday have lured us into. But why people should neglect worship because it is summer and the sun happens to be shining, I fail to understand. The only reason I can give for such behaviour by those who call themselves Christians is that it is one of the devil's tricks to intice men away from God, and his device is meeting with no little success. One hears a lot of twaddle talked about men who do not go to Church being as good as those who do, about there being no sin in taking innocent recreation on Sunday, and about Sunday being the only day in the week they have to themselves for visiting or entertaining their friends. Of course I know that according to the standard of the world there are as good men amongst those who neglect worship as there are amongst the regular Church-goers, but then the world's standard is not the same as God's and he does not expect to see the self-righteous at worship in His House of Prayer since He, in the Person of Jesus Christ, came to call sinners to repentance. Further, there is ample time for innocent recreation and for seeing ones friends between the appointed times of service, but recreation that deprives men of the opportunities of attending public worship, to say nothing of robbing them of their necessary one day's rest in seven, ceases to be innocent, it becomes harmful. Attendance at worship is the outward and visible sign of the inward working of God's grace in the hearts of men. I believe that in most nonchurchgoing men and women there is a good deal of religion at the bottom, but it fails to come to the surface and play the part it should do in

everyday life because it is not linked up with God. It has been said that the only solution to most of our difficulties to-day is co-operation. Well, why not take God into this co-operative movement? If we did this I am sure that all would work together for the good, not of self, but of the whole community, and the outcome of such a movement would be churches full to overflowing with people who had learnt the true meaning of the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. and could not refain from attending their Heavenly Father's weekly "At Homes" to render with the whole Family their joyful acts of worship, and to catch something more of His Spirit to help them in the labours of the week that follows.

Our minds are at present very full of our coming Annual Fête, which is to take place in the Vicarage Grounds, on Wednesday, July 22nd, from 3 p m. to 10.30 p.m. Beyond being a means of filling up the financial coffer of the Church, it is the annual social gathering of the people, and I want you all to work together to make it a real social success. To do this, Mr. Jones must not wait to be introduced to Mr. Smith, but realising that you are all brothers and sisters in Christ. Don't hesitate to talk to one another, and especially to make any stranger or lonely person feel at home amongst us. There are one or two new side-shows and competitions, particulars of which you will find under the Parish News. We should be most grateful for gifts of toys, pounds of anything, flowers, fruit and vegetables for the stalls, and cakes, etc., for the refreshment department. You will notice that the price for admission is a shilling up to five o'clock, and sixpence each after that hour, children under fourteen being admitted at half-price.
