My DEAR PEOPLE,

A New Year! And what shall my message be at its outset? We have been passing through very dark days and there are few people who have not suffered many anxieties as a consequence of the crisis in the Coal Industry. Black, however, as the outlook was not so many weeks ago, I think the silver lining to the dark cloud is already appearing. And so I bid you start the year 1927 with a spirit of optimism and determination to curtail the enormous waste of time spent in pleasure seeking and to increase the effort towards recovery. Above all I trust that much more thought and time will be devoted to God and the things of God, because I believe that if we put first things, the all important the eternal things first, all other things will take their place in due proportion. May God's blessing rest upon you all and may He prosper the labours of our hands during the coming year!

Our Christmas Festival was a truly happy time. The services were very fairly well attended and the musical portion of them was admirably rendered by the choir. I am most grateful for the beautiful flowers and evergreens which were sent for the decorations and to the decorators who so beautifully adorned the House of God. The collections, which were given to the Sick and Needy Fund, did not amount to as much as last year by some four pounds.

You will find under the Parish News an account of what is termed the "Follow up Conference" in connection with the Missionary School which was held at the end of November last

year. You will notice that we are going to concentrate our efforts for the work of the Church Overseas in a Parochial Missionary Association. Whatever money is raised by the Association will be divided amongst the three Societies which the Parish has been supporting for many years in equal proportion. The far more important work of the Association will be of an educational character. I hope that the result of our enterprise may be a great increase of zeal in carrying out the commission of our Divine Master to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. On the seventeenth of this month we are holding our Annual Parochial Church Meeting. This is the yearly gathering of all who have been enrolled on the Electoral Roll. Its purpose is to hear an account of the work done by the Parochial Church Council during the past year and to elect a new Church Council and other officers. A report of the finances of the parish will also be made. I do hope that we shall have a large gathering and that the election to various offices will be much keener than it has been in years past.

We sincerely congratulate the Girl Guides on their great success at their Christmas Bazaar and Jumble Sale. The Company under Captain Dowsett is doing good work and numbers are increasing.

The Sea Scouts are also to be heartily congratulated on the result of their Entertainment, which was held early in December last. This organisation under Scout Master C. Abbott is very popular amongst the boys. The boys meet in the Church Room on Mondays and Fridays, and I am sure Mr. Abbott would extend a very cordial welcome to any visitors who are interested in the work of the Troupe.

MISSIONARY SCHOOL.—The Missionary School held in the Church Room from 26th November to 3rd December was a decided success. The average attendance more than fulfilled our expectations and the lectures were much appreciated. The appropriate atmosphere was created at the outset by the Rev. R. L. Currey in an admirable paper entitled "God and the World To-day." After enumerating and tracing the development of the diverse factors which have contributed to the unique and perplexing World situation with which we are confronted to-day, the lecturer proceeded to adduce evidence of the new spirit of enquiry into the claims of Christianity which is now abroad, and to urge the necessity of a drastic application of the ethics of the Gospel to the internal and external affairs of the Christian nations of the West in order to demonstrate before the World the practical, as well as the preceptive character of the religion of Christ. In the course of the week 48 books and pamphlets were sold to the value of f3 10s. 2d. The splendid attendance at the "Follow-up Conference" held on 17th December in the Vestry under the Chairmanship of the Vicar, bore testimony to the fact that the School had achieved its purpose. Mr. Milton proposed, and Mr. Basey seconded the resolution "That this meeting shall form itself into a Missionary Association," which was unanimously. Miss Jakeman was unanimously elected, and consented to act as Secretary to the Association. The meeting then discussed methods of procedure. It was decided that a short monthly Intercession Service for Foreign Missions should be held on the second Sunday after Matins and Evensong alternately, to commence on the second Sunday in January after Matins. A "Study Circle" was arranged to meet monthly on the Friday previous to the second Sunday, in the Church Room at 8 p.m. The first meeting will

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be held on Friday, 11th February, when we hope to begin a study of Mr. Basil Matthew's book "The Clash of Colour." Finally it was agreed to instal a Missionary Lending Library in Church. This will be brought into existence as soon as possible in the New Year and the Misses Gray and Piper have kindly consented to act as Librarians. Books will be loaned for one month at a time at the rate of two pence per volume, but may be changed weekly before or after Matins and Evensong. Gifts of volumes towards the
