My DEAR PEOPLE,

With this month begin the winter parochial activities. The Band of Hope, Bible Classes and Lads' Club have begun, and, with the evenings drawing in, the numbers of the first and last will gradually increase. With regard to the Bible Classes, I should like to know that a much larger number of girls and lads were joining up. In a daily paper a little while ago there was an account of a meeting of Bible Class leaders in the Diocese of Liverpool. From that account one realised what a feature of Church life the Bible Class is in the North. Why should it not have as prominent a place in the work of the Church down South? So many of our young people imagine that their religious education ceases when they reach the fourteenth year of their age, and I am afraid the parents do little to upset this false idea. In fact, most Church people, young and old, are very ignorant of their Bible, which, after all, is not only the most helpful book in life, but the most interesting book for study. I do hope, then, that parents will urge their children to join the Bible Classes.

The grown-ups are also going to have a chance of further study of this wonderful book. Beginning on the third Sunday in October, there will be a half-an-hour's meeting in Church after Evensong each Sunday for the consideration of some portion of the Scriptures. I trust that many will seize this opportunity of gaining knowledge of their Bible.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving Services are on the second Sunday in October. You will find the times of services and the special preachers under the Parish News. The farmers of England have suffered badly from the weather this year, and I fear that some of the smallholders have been brought to the verge of ruin. Our sympathy and prayers will go out for them; but when we think that so little of the food which we consume is grown in the country, we still have cause to thank Him Whose mercy still endures, I shall be glad to receive the usual gifts for decoration on Saturday morning, October 8th, at the Church between half-past nine and half-past ten.

I would draw your particular attention to notices in the Parish News about meetings in connection with the Work of the Church Overseas. Especially would I remind you of our Annual Sale of Work on Wednesday, October 26th. We are prolonging the time of this effort till half-past nine, so that many who do not leave their work until six o'clock may have an opportunity of looking in to do their bit for Christ's work amongst those who as yet know Him not.

May I just add one word or two to the "appreciation" of Mrs. Thornton Coe, written in another place by one who has known the family much longer than I have. When the south aisle in the Church was dedicated, Mr. and Mrs. Coe occupied the two seats in which they have sat regularly Sunday by Sunday ever since, until they were hindered by infirmity from coming to God's House. What an example! Would that many more husbands and wives would follow it !! Our deepest sympathy goes out to Mr. and Miss Coe in their sad bereavement.

Mr. Jordan, who has been superintendent of the Boys' Sunday School for very many years, and has been a very useful and loyal worker in other Church work, relinquished his position in the Sunday School at the end of last month. I shall miss his untiring help, and I am sure the children also will miss him.

All who knew her felt she was a real friend, who spoke kindly of others, and had a cheery smile and word for each—taking interest in their troubles and joys. In 1866 she was one of the

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first "mothers" to join the "Mothers' Meeting started by Mrs. Fitz-Wygram, wife of the first Vicar of St. James'. Mrs. Thornton Coe has often spoken of those happy afternoons spent in the Vicarage, and how much she was helped in her busy and difficult life by the instruction givenwhen she had a large family of eight or nine children to provide for, in days too when school fees for each child had to be paid, and wages were very small. From that time Mrs. Coe has remained a most loyal and untiring member of each successive Mothers' Meeting, and unswerving in her loyalty to each Vicar of the Parish, to the time of her "passing on" in her eighty-first year, setting a wonderful example to the older and younger mothers.

In later years when the Mothers' Union was formed she at once joined it, and only ill-health has prevented her for the past eighteen months from attending Church or any meetings. Sorrows and troubles have come heavily upon her, but with undying faith and trust she has met and overcome them, by always seeking for strength, grace and patience at the feet of her beloved Master.

With her husband she regularly knelt at the Altar and received the Blessed Sacrament. When through infirmities of old age and bad health they have been confined to the house, with intense reverence and thankfulness they have made their Communions at home, and expressed their gratitude to the Vicar for ministering to them.

Great sympathy is felt for Mr. Thornton Coe and his daughter and other members of the family. After 65 years of married life, the loneliness for him is intense, and so much increased by his deafness and his bad health.

A large number of mothers, representing both the Mothers' Meeting and the Mothers' Union, were present at the funeral, when amidst many tokens of love and respect Mrs. Coe was laid to rest; and her quiet, sweet influence will remain with her many friends "until the Day dawns, and the shadows flee away."
