My DEAR PEOPLE,

Of the three outstanding events of last month which call for comment, by far the most successful was the Hampton Choirs' Festival Service. The Church was filled as it rarely is in these days and the whole service was inspiring. I hope the Canon's remarks about psalm-singing will be taken to heart, especially by the adult members of the Choirs, and that they will be more patient with their Choir Masters when much time at the practices is taken up with the pointing of the psalms. At present, there is room in our own Choir for two or three adult members. Mr. Russe would gladly welcome gentlemen who are fair readers at practice on any Thursday at 8 o'clock, or he would arrange an interview at his own house, St. Kilda, Windmill Road.

The Week of Prayer did not come up to my expectation. During the week, few in comparison took advantage of the many opportunities for prayer which were provided. It was disappointing, and yet one still hopes that a time will come when those who call themselves Christians will not be satisfied with such a meagre output of Christian devotion as they are accustomed to at present.

The Services on Armistice Day were well attended. Several of the Congregation were disappointed that we did not make more of the Sunday before or the Sunday in the Octave, but I think these missed the whole point in my letter of last month, which was that it appeared to me to be more fitting to make more of the Day itself than to transfer our thoughts and feelings on the subject to a Sunday before or after the actual day. However, next year, this Annual Commemoration will fall on a Sunday.

There is one social event which I must mention. Owing to the kindness of Mrs Holt, a Whist Drive was held at her house, and I received a cheque for five pounds towards the Parish Hall Fund as a result. I am very grateful to Mrs. Holt and hope that others will follow her example.

The financial result of the concert held in November was not quite as good as I had anticipated. Expenses in connection with such efforts are always heavy, but when you have to hire the bulk of the chairs it adds considerably to one's liabilities. The actual balance will be seven pounds three shillings and three pence. A complete financial statement will be given next month.

I am sure that you will all be glad to know that Mr. Alford, the Headmaster of our Boys' School, is convalescing, and hopes to be back at school again soon. Miss Mellish, the Headmistress of the Infants' Department, was taken ill last month and will not be at school again till after Christmas. All who know her will sympathise with her in her sickness, and will hope that she may soon be restored to health.

The Christmas Festival is drawing very near. At the request of certain members of the congregation, I am having a Midnight Celebration of the Holy Communion, which will commence at a quarter before midnight. It will be a plain celebration with a few of the Christmas hymns. As it is the fourth Sunday in the month, we shall have our usual Choral Celebration, which will begin at a quarter-to-ten, instead of ten o'clock. There will be Matins and Sermon at eleven, and this will be followed by a plain Celebration of the Holy Communion at 12 noon. The other Celebrations of the Holy Communion are at seven o'clock and eight o'clock. I shall be very grateful for flowers and evergreens for the decorations. They should be sent to the Church on Saturday
