My DEAR PEOPLE,

During the crisis through which our part of the Holy Catholic Church is passing, it behoves every member and each congregation to betake themselves to earnest prayer, and especially during the week February 6th-10th, during which period the National Assembly of the Church of England will be in session. The future peace and goodwill within the Church will largely depend upon the result of the deliberations of the Three Houses within the Assembly, and I feel sure that, whatever our opinions concerning the Prayer Book may be, we all long for a period of tranquility in which to get on with the real work the Church has to do, viz., the propagation of the power of the Spirit of Jesus Christ throughout the world for the salvation of mankind. Let us pray, then, that the Holy Spirit may rest upon the members of the National Assembly, guiding them in all their work to do nothing more nor less than God's Will.

Lent seems to be coming upon us rather quickly this year. The end of the month will find us at the commencement of this solemn season. I need not remind you that it is a time of real fasting and prayer. It is the season in the Church's year when the individual comes into prominence, as each earnest Churchman and Churchwoman, looking his or her living Lord in the face, exclaims, "Thou gavest Thyself for me," and returns answer, stricken with a sense of shame, "What have I done for Thee?" And then proceeds by penitential self-denial to bring a wayward soul under the strict discipline of its most holy religion. To each one must be left the provision of acts of self-denial, except that I would suggest the curtailment of pleasure to be amongst the prominent things in which we may deny ourselves. As for further opportunities for prayer and meditation, I have been trying to provide extra preachers for the usual additional Lenten services. A complete list of services and preachers will be circulated in ample time for you to make your arrangements for what I trust will prove to be a time of real spiritual refreshment and growth.

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There is one thing that I have very near to my heart, and it is the increase of interest amongst us of the Church at Home in the work of our Church Overseas. I believe that the initial step in this increase of interest is increase of knowledge. I would therefore most earnestly commend to your notice our Missionary Library. It has its special corner in the Church, and the librarians are always in attendance on Sundays after the services to loan out books from which we can learn what the Church is doing for our own people and for those in other parts of the world who as yet do not know Jesus Christ and His love. Even if you are not at present favourably disposed to what is called Foreign Missions, do make full use of this means of information, and I am sure you will learn not only to appreciate but to take an active part in fulfilling the loving injunction of your Saviour to His Church, and therefore to you as a member of His Church, to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

With our Sunday School Prize-giving there ends the Christmas Treats for the year. I want to place on record my very great sense of gratitude to the many kind friends who by subscriptions and other generous help have made it possible to give our young people much enjoyment.

Our annual Parochial Church Meeting showed an increased attendance over previous years, and yet there is room for very great improvement. I want you all to take an active interest in your Church's affairs. If you did, I feel sure that we

A CALL TO CHURCH PEOPLE.

Attention is called to the Middlesex County Council triennial election on March 7th next, in view of the attempt that will be made by the Cinema Trade to oppose Councillors who have voted for the Sunday closing of the cinemas. Sunday opening, it is stated, "is a prize worth winning," and is estimated to be worth £7,000,000

per annum to the proprietors ("Cinema," August 26th, 1926). On Middlesex is laid the non-success in recent years of the Sunday opening campaigns, and at the last election "Middlesex first" was the suggested motto. The decision of the County Council in October last against Sunday cinemas was reported in nearly 100 papers throughout the country, and had, without doubt, far-reaching Every effort will be made therefore to effect. reverse the policy of the Council.

It is a call to the Christian Church to see that no Councillor loses his seat because he has resisted the commercialisation of Sunday, and all are asked to ascertain the views of candidates and to record their votes in its defence. The Sunday cinema must in fairness be followed by the Sunday music hall and theatre, with increased labour and serious effect on the religious life of our country.
