My DEAR PEOPLE,

The small handbills announcing the arrangements for special Courses and Addresses for Lent should be in everybody's hands by now. If, however, there are any members of the congregation who have not secured one, will they ask the Clergy or the Verger for one? Opportunities are plentiful, and the times should be convenient for most people. There may be some who cannot be present at any of the Services. To such, may I throw out the recommendation that they spend some quiet time at home in meditation upon some portion of scripture and prayer. They might also buy a copy of Canon Woodward's book, "Christ in the Common Ways of Life," and gain much help from reading it. Anyhow, let us all try and observe profitably this solemn forty days' fast.

At the first Parochial Church Council, some suggestions were made with regard to the services, some of which I shall hope to give a trial. It was asked, e.g., whether the Litany might be used on some Sunday in the month and I am going to use it on the Second Sunday in the month. Others asked if it were possible to shorten the psalms. I know this is done in many Churches, but I do not propose to try the experiment yet. It is well for us to remember that while we should like one thing, another might want something else. At the present time it is well that we should not make too many alterations. Rather let us wait until the vexed question of the Prayer Book has been settled and then we shall be able to discuss probable alterations for the brightening and beautifying of our services.

On the matter of finance, original suggestions for paying our way were not forthcoming. The one, however, which appeared to me to come nearest to helping the Council to realize their responsibility with regard to raising the necessary amount for parochial purposes, was the suggestion that each member should endeavour to obtain so much in new donations before the next meeting. From one or two enquiries which have come to hand during the last few weeks, I am sure that many Churchmen who are not too regular in their attendance at worship would be willing to bear their share of the expenses of the maintenance of the House of their Father in their midst if only needs were explained. I only hope that the Parochial Church Councillors are getting busy.

Although Confirmation will not be administered before the end of June, we are making our plans for classes, and we shall be glad to have names of intending candidates sent to us as soon as possible.

I was sorry to miss the Organ Recital given by Mr. Wolstenholme, but I heard how much the large congregation enjoyed it, and I am pleased that so good a sum as seven pounds six shillings and tenpence was collected for such a worthy object.

I was glad to see a very fair number of people present at the Lantern Lecture on South America which was very interesting and instructive. It was encouraging to find a good sprinkling of young men taking an interest in the work of the Church Overseas.

This month, the Missionary Association is going to discuss some question concerning the Report on our Own People Overseas. It is a subject full of interest to all and I hope we shall have a large gathering.
