My DEAR PEOPLE,

Once again Parliament has rejected "The Revised Prayer Book Measure" for reasons almost identical with those of last December. There are many who are not sorry that the Book has not received Parliamentary sanction, while many more —and amongst them the majority of those who, for a better description, we may say belong to the central body of Churchmen-will imagine that Parliament have done the wrong thing. However, we must not forget that the Church as a whole has been invoking the guidance of the Holy Spirit in this matter, and that in the result of the action of the House of Commons we have an answer to our prayers. From this it would appear that God has some better way of leading His Church in this land into unity and concord, which He will in time reveal. It is for us, then, to have patience and to continue to call upon Him for guidance into the right way.

The Bishop of Kensington will administer Confirmation at Hampton Wick Parish Church on Tuesday, July 10th, at 8 p.m. I would ask your prayers for the candidates and especially for those from this Parish. I would also plead with the elder members of the Parish who call themselves Churchmen, particularly those who are parents, to endeavour to set these young Soldiers of Christ a good example in the observance of religious exercises, especially on Sundays. The making or marring of the spiritual lives of these whom God will bless and strengthen with His Holy Spirit is to a much greater degree in the hands of the laity than of the clergy. May the laity realise their great responsibility, and act up to it.

At last the day of the Consecration of the addition to our Churchyard is drawing very near. I hope all who can will be present when the Bishop of Kensington comes on Tuesday, July 10th, at 4.30 p.m., to "set apart from all profane and common uses" the new plot of ground.

Our band of willing workers have been busy in the Churchyard of late. I am very grateful for their kind help in keeping God's Acre tidy, and I would welcome others who would join them on Wednesday evenings.

When our Parochial Church Council last met they were faced with a financial deficit of over £60, which has grown now to over £100. With this unpleasant situation before them, they resolved that the Parish was unable to raise the necessary stipend (£250 per annum) for a full-time Assistant Priest, and that, with much regret, it would be necessary to ask Mr. Milton to seek another sphere of work. As this was the considered view of the Parochial Church Council, the body in a Parish now responsible for the raising of the necessary parochial funds, I said that I would do what I could single-handed to carry on the spiritual work in the Parish until such time as the debt was wiped off. I hope you will all clearly understand that this means a curtailment in the efficient working of the Parish, and that with the growth of population it is impossible for one man to adequately cope with the visiting, to mention but one item. I still believe that the money could be raised, if all who use the Church would bear their fair share towards all the expenses connected with it. May I suggest that if all those who have been in Church for one service or another during the last month would send as an act of self-denial at least ten shillings each before the Fête, we should be clear of debt, and the possibility of retaining our Assistant Priest would be assured.

And now just a word about the Fête. You will see the advertisement about it on another page. All the Committees are working with a will to make it a huge success from their point of view. All we want is a fine day and a big crowd with pockets full of money. I would remind those whose work is in town that they need not go home for their meal at night, because most excellent meals are provided at a very reasonable cost on the Vicarage lawn. Goods for the various stalls, as for example grocery, flowers, fruit, vegetables, sweets, needlework, refreshments, etc., will be gratefully received at the Vicarage on or before Tuesday, July 17th.
