My Dear People,

It is many years since illness reduced our congregations as they have been reduced during the cold spell of weather with which we were visited during a large part of last month. Our sympathy goes out to all who have been suffering from influenza, bronchial and other colds: they have been continually in our thoughts and prayers, and we wish them a speedy restoration to health.

The Angel of Death has been busy amongst us of late. In the number of those who have "passed on" to their Rest are Mrs. Macartney, a very regular member of the congregation when in good health, and Mrs. Glenister, an old and respected resident, who has been more or less bed-ridden for the last few years. We deeply sympathise with the relatives in their sad bereavements, and pray that God's consoling grace may rest upon them in their sorrow.

We have nearly reached mid-Lent, and I hope that with warmer weather the congregations on Sundays and at the special Lent services will considerably increase.

I have put a list of services for Holy Week and Easter in the Parish News, but I shall supplement this notice with a more individual reminder a little later on. I would draw your attention to the alteration this month whereby there will be NO CHORAL CELEBRATION on the fourth Sunday in the month, but there will be a Choral Celebration of the Holy Communion on EASTER DAY at 9.45 a.m.

The new Parochial Church Council has commenced its duties. The most important matter in its programme for this year has to do with the old school buildings. The Finance Committee has been given power to deal with this matter, and especially to go forward with as little delay as possible with the conversion of the premises used by the Boys' School into a Parish Hall. Every effort must be made to raise the necessary money required. I hope to put before you a definite scheme when I know what the cost will be. In the meantime individuals might like to add to a small amount in hand by holding whist drives, etc., in their houses amongst their friends. I should also be glad to receive cheques towards the Building Fund of the Parish Hall. We must, however, concentrate on our Annual Fête and try to raise a very considerable sum over and above that needed for parochial purposes. The provisional date for the Fête is Wednesday, July 10th.

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Once more we are chartering a 'bus for one of the S P.G. Albert Hall Meetings. I hope we may have such a number of applications for seats that it may be possible to charter two 'busses this year.

In connection with the effort which the Church has been and is making to arouse greater interest in her work overseas, I want to bring to your notice an event which will take place in this Rural Deanery between September 22nd and 29th next. During that period we are to have an Undergraduate (Student) Missionary Campaign. This means that some sixteen young Oxford and Cambridge University Students are coming into the Hampton Rural Deanery to endeavour to stir up enthusiam in the various parishes with regard to the Missionary work of the Church in other parts of the world. They will be billeted two and two in the parishes where they are invited to work, and it is specially to be noted that they particularly ask not to be put up at the Vicarage. As far as we here are concerned, I hope to be able to have two of these young undergraduates in this parish from September 22nd for about five days, and I should be glad of offers of hospitality for them. The work which they will do must of necessity be supple-

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mented by a good deal of preparatory work, which we have to be doing during the intervening months. The most important part of our preparation is prayer. To begin with, then, the special "Intention" at the 7.30 Holy Communion Service on Fridays from now onwards will be the Missionary Campaign; special intercessions will be included in our Monthly Intercession Services; and a Service of Intercession for this one object will be held each Wednesday at 8 p.m., lasting about a quarter of an hour. In addition I would ask all members of the Missionary Association to remember the Missionary Campaign in their daily devotions.

This year the Confirmation will be at the Parish Church, Hampton. The date is Tuesday, July 16th. It is time that the Godparents were busy reminding their Godchildren of their duty as Churchmen. It seems very clear that the initial step in coming forward for preparation for Confirmation rests upon the shoulders of the Godparents and not with the young people. "YE are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him . . ." is the final instruction given to the Godparents in the Baptismal Office. I would also remind you that the age is not sixteen years but "as soon as he can say the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments in the common tongue, and be further instructed in the Church Catechism set forth for that purpose." In these days when young people are more advanced than they were years ago, a child may have come to the age for Confirmation at any time from twelve years and upwards. Should there be some who have always called themselves members of the Church of England, but who have not been confirmed mainly through the neglect of their Godparents, I would gladly arrange preparation classes for these at any time, in order that they may not only conform to the regulations of the Church of

which they claim membership, but more especially may be admitted to partake of the greatest of all means of grace in the Sacrament of the Holy Communion.

I have not received any response to the appeal for helpers among the young people in Sunday School, Bible Class and Club which I made last month. Will those who really ought to be doing some piece of definite work for God in the Church just look at that scene on Calvary which is prominently before us during this season of Lent, the Crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ? He made that offering of Himself for you because He loved you. And now He is asking you to offer yourselves for the various pieces of work that are to be done in the parish, as a manifestation of your love for Him. Is it nothing to you?
