My DEAR PEOPLE,

In my twenty-seven years in Orders I have never had a greater disappointment than to be laid aside through illness during Holy Week and the Easter Festival. It certainly was unfortunate, and yet through Mr. Jakeman's untiring energy, two excellent priests were found to carry on the services. I am also very grateful to Mr. Quehen and Mr. Grace for their kind help on Palm Sunday. I desire most sincerely to thank you all for your kind enquiries and prayers during my illness.

Once more I thank you all very much for your kindness to me at Easter. The Services were very well attended, the number of communicants being over four hundred. I am grateful to those who sent flowers for the decorations and also to the decorators.

This month is one in which three great Festivals of the Church occur. First of all comes Ascension Day. This Empire Day of the Church may very well be better observed by Church people. It falls on a week-day (Thursday), and for that reason is sadly neglected. There are celebrations of the Holy Communion at times to suit a great number of churchmen and churchwomen, and there is also a Festal Evensong at which many more might be present if they tried. I do hope the congregations will show an improvement on former years. Then comes Whit Sunday, the annual commemoration of the Birthday of the Church. Surely all who profess to belong to the Church should take a delight in keeping this Festival. Think of the many spiritual blessings you enjoy through the Church in your midst, and come and render a great act of thanksgiving for the opportunities for obtaining spiritual refreshment and strength that are given to you. And lastly there

is Trinity Sunday—the expediency of this Festival and the appropriateness of the day set apart for it, can scarcely be questioned. The two opposite tendencies, to recognise the Unity without the Trinity, and the Trinity without the Unity of the Godhead, are as strong as ever, and underlie some dangerous theological errors of our own day. In the Incarnation, Death, Resurrection and Ascension of our Lord, we see the love of both the Father and the Son, for it was the Father who sent His Son into the world. In the marvellous works wrought on the Day of Penticost we see the special work of the Holy Spirit, and on Trinity Sunday we worship Father, Son and Holy Spirit, as one God, of one substance, power and majesty, equally concerned in our redemption. Let all Churchpeople join in acknowledging the glory of the Eternal Trinity.

Confirmation Classes have started. For boys on Wednesday's at half-past six and eight o'clock, and for girls on Monday's at eight o'clock. I am rather disappointed at the number who have come forward up to now for preparation. I know we shall have the confirmation at our own church next year, but as it is important not to put off till to-morrow what you can do to-day, so it is more important not to put off till next year any spiritual blessing you may be able to obtain this year. Twelve months has often made the difference between being confirmed and not being confirmed. And so I would urge those who are over fifteen years of age to think seriously before letting this opportunity go by.

We have fixed the Sunday School Treat for Tuesday, July 2nd. It has been agreed that we shall once more go to Bognor by Motor Coach Particulars concerning parents and any adults and juveniles who would like to join our outing can be obtained from Miss Gibbon, Mr. Lewin Singleton and myself.

for that part of the old school buildings which are not required for parochial purposes. The rent will go a long way in meeting the expenses of the upkeep of the remainder of the buildings and paying the caretaker.

This is the month for May Meetings of various church organisations. If I were to put up on the notice board all the various bills of announcement I should require another large board. However, I have drawn your attention to them under the Parish News.

The 1st Hampton Hill Wolf Cubs are having a Bazaar in aid of the Pack Funds, and I do hope it will be well patronized. Mrs. Abbott is doing an excellent work amongst the small boys of the parish. A work such as this cannot be carried on without expense, which the payments of the members cannot be expected to meet entirely, and it is only by raising funds in some way as this that the efficiency of the work can be maintained. Let us all journey to the Old Boys' Schools on May 8th then and give what support we can to the cause.

Rogation Sunday, May 5th, is Diocesan Sunday. Intercessions for the work of the Church in the Diocese will be incorporated in our Services, and the Collections at Matins and Evensong will go

towards our quota to the Diocesan Fund. Last year we only sent £26 instead of £54. I do ask for your very liberal support so that we may be able to pay our quota of obligations at least, in 1929.
