First of all there is the Confirmation at Hampton Parish Cnurch. It is well for us even if we do not know any of the Candidates, to be present. We can offer our prayers with the congregation for the young lives about to take upon themselves the responsibilities of full membership in the Church, and many of them just going out into the real and hard battle of life; we can also think of our own Confirmation and consider how, up to now, we have carried the responsibilities of membership in Christ's Body, and what sort of a fight we have put up against our besetting sin, and the general evil in the world. And may be the Bishop's message will just fit our own case, and we shall come away with greater earnestness for the cause of our most holy religion.

The first is a meeting of those interested in the youth of the Parish, and in the cause of the work of the Church overseas to consider how best to use the two young undergraduates when they are in the Parish. The other is a Devotional Service, which I hope will be conducted by a neighbouring Vicar. In the meantime will you all pray for this venture, that God's blessing may rest upon the young men who are coming to stir up enthusiasm in this Parish for the great work of our Church abroad. Of the social functions the most important is the Fête. You have only to study the "Bill of Fare" as set out on the posters to realise what an attractive programme has been arranged for your pleasure and for the benefit of parochial funds. Of course, we hope for a fine day, but chiefly we hope for a very great crowd of people. I am constantly being asked to attend and do what I can at other functions. I do hope that we shall see many of those interested in these other causes returning the compliment by being present at our Fête. Each year we do slightly increase our balance. Let us

try this year to make such a financial success that a considerable sum may be placed to the credit of the Parish Hall Fund.

The Sunday School Treat to Bognor will be over almost before most of you get your copies of this magazine. We are taking six coach loads of youngsters and adults to this very popular seaside resort. Some of our kind supporters have not yet sent me their very welcomed subscriptions. Will such please do so at once.

Besides these events there is the Children's Sports which are held in the Manor House Field, on Wednesday, July 17th. It is an occasion well worth while the patronage of any who can spare the time to attend. Besides being a thoroughly enjoyable day's outing for the children and many of their parents, it is a spectacle of keenly contested sports by children whose aim is to bring honour to the school to which they belong.

I am hoping this year to take a full and unbroken month's rest, and according to present arrangements I leave for Dorsetshire on July 27th. I am hoping to secure a locum for that period, but if that is impossible I must ask you to accept a Priest for Sunday duty with a neighbouring friend at hand to take emergency duty.

THANKS. The Vicar extends his very best thanks to Miss Swain and the Lad's Club for supplying the Parish with two new Tea Urns.


