#### My Dear People,

A great number of you will be starting for your holidays about now. I do hope you will all have a nice time and will be blessed with fine weather. The other day I met a parson friend who said that the holiday exodus had already begun in his parish. He also told me that many of his congregation sent him cheques for the amount they put in the collection for the Sundays they would be away. I could not help wishing that the members of my congregation would do the same. I am hoping to be away for a fortnight or three weeks towards the end of the month, but I have nothing definitely fixed at the moment.

I am constantly being told how much everybody enjoyed the Fête this year. It did seem to be that there was quite a happy family feeling amongst those who were present. The lawn and field were excellently laid out and if only we had had more customers for the teas and suppers we should have been quite up to last year's net takings. However, the small drop in the total balance can be accounted for by the fact that many who are usually with us were on holiday. Now I should like to give a list of all to whom I owe a debt of gratitude for whatever piece of work they may have undertaken in connection with the Fête. But I dare not begin to mention names lest I should miss even one; and so I want to thank them one and all most sincerely for their splendid work. It is extremely gratifying to know that there are such numbers who are willing to work hard to make a success of our annual venture.

The Parish Hall is rapidly taking shape and a visit to School Road will be rewarded by getting some idea of what it will look like when it is finished. A nice sum of money has been added to the Building Fund from the Fête, but we must not think that all our efforts to raise money are at an end just yet. We shall require some five or six hundred pounds more and I should like to be able to open the Hall free of debt. I am, however, afraid that this would mean too great a strain on our efforts and purses. No doubt there are many who have not yet sent their donations in. Well, directly you have got over the holiday expenses. begin to save up for the Parish Hall Fund until you have reached a sum which you feel you can spare and then send it along to Mr. Jakeman. I have been told of one or two efforts to raise money by Whist and Bridge Drives in the autumn and I hope these schemes will mature. Let us see to it that no one is left out from the joy of being able to say "I am proud at having had a hand in putting up such a fine Parish Hall."

It was quite a joy to have the Bishop of Kensington with us again. The Confirmation Service was very inspiring. Eighty candidates were presented, thirty-five from our own parish. The Thank Offerings made by the candidates and congregation amounted to a little over six pounds. The Bishop in acknowledging the cheques said "It is a very gratifying offering and greatly appreciated by my daughter."
