Parish Hall, on June 4th, in order that we may get to work on our study circles.

We have not had any appreciable increase in the number of subscribers to the Freewill Offering or Assessment Scheme. Only fifty five out of over four hundred communicants give anything beyond their collection to the Funds of the Parish. And it is but comparatively few who are at Church every Sunday throughout the year or who make up in the collections on the Sundays when they attend for the Sundays they are absent. I am sure that if you compared the amount you give to God for the work of the Church in this Parish with what you spend on your own pleasure you would be surprised. I would suggest that anyone who is earning thirty shillings a week can give sixpence a week to Church Funds and he who earns three pounds a week could give a shilling a week and so on in proportion to income. If this practice were systematically carried out I should never have to bore you with constant appeals, it would rather be my pleasant duty to thank you all for sharing the financial burden and relieving me and the Finance Committee of much anxiety. Personally I do not see how our giving is to be regular unless we make a definite promise. Let us all therefore promise something per week say from 3d. to any amount, over and above our collection money. Forms of promise can be obtained from me or the Churchwardens or the Verger. Take a form, fill it up and return it at once and then watch the result of your effort in the balance sheet at the end of the year and you will be filled with amazement. One of the results of such systematic giving by all who call themselves Churchmen or Churchwomen will be the employment of a full-time Curate in the Parish.

We are looking forward to the Archdeacon's Visitation on the first of this month at a quarter

to eight in the evening. I expect many of our Church Councillors and other members of the congregation will be present. Prebendary Thicknesse will, I am sure, give us some sound counsel and words to cheer us on our way.

I hope that many of the congregation in addition to the relations and friends of the candidates will find their way to St. John's Church, Hampton Wick, for the Confirmation. It is an opportunity for us to make a renewal of our own Baptismal vows, and we are sure to receive a message of real spiritual value from the Bishop of Kensington.

Please book the day of our Annual Fête and accept no other engagement. We want you all there to welcome the Bishop of London, and we need your patronage at the stalls and sideshows also. We have not yet realised the £200 balance which I always aim at. It only requires another forty pounds to last year's balance. Let us try and achieve it this year.
