## Vicar's Letter.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,

Influenza is fashionable just now. I do most sincerely sympathize with all who are unfortunately in the fashion and hope they will soon be restored to normal health. This annual spring infection has no doubt much to answer for as a hindrance to Churchgoing. It is a pity, because one does look for a little more sustained effort in regular attendance at Church during Lent. However, it cannot be helped and I only hope that the victims will, on recovery, hasten to God's House to return thanks and to continue their fellowship of worship with the other members of the congregation. Passion Sunday, Holy Week with Good Friday are not far ahead. As we contemplate our Lord's suffering, agony and death for us men and our salvation, let us withdraw more from our worldly occupations and pleasures and spend much time in prayer, meditation and worship. The state of our own land and of the world, demand the concentrated effort of the faithful in sustained prayer, because it is only by communion with God that we shall understand what His Will under present circumstances is, and it is only the carrying out of His Will that will assure success in any enterprise for world peace.

And then we are all anticipating our Easter Festival, when we draw near to greet our risen Lord, especially in our Communions. Let us duly prepare for that great Holy and Joyful Festival in which I pray that a rich blessing and joy may be shed amongst us. I shall be glad to receive flowers, etc., for the decoration of the Church. Please send them on the Saturday between half-past nine and half-past ten in the morning.

The Choir are this year rendering their usual Lenten Cantata on Good Friday Evening, at 8 o'clock. I hope that many will be present, not to hear the singing but to join in an act of devotion.

I am very pleased with the progress that is being made with the Young People's Social Guild. Membership is on the increase and I am glad to see the young people becoming more regular at Church and in their Communions. Two features of last month's programme were a Debate on "Country Life versus Town Life," in which the majority preferred Life in the Country, and an interesting Lecture by the Rev. C. K. A. Kemp, of Durham University.

various Committees to serve for this year. There are two things that will employ their energies during their time of office. They are set to raise the extra £133 to meet the expenses on the cleaning of the Organ and the necessary repairs and decorations to the Church. And they want to assure the proper upkeep of the Churchyard. Besides the employment of extra professional labour, it will be necessary to have some additional voluntary help if the Churchyard is to be kept as it should be. The Churchyard Committee would therefore gladly welcome any offer of help. Names of volunteers should be given to Mr. Evans as soon as possible. It is with the greatest pleasure that I have received the offer of two entertainments towards the Parish Hall Fund and the Parochial expenses. I do hope that others will come forward with similar offers. I feel that with such a Hall in our midst it might be used much more parochially and that parochial Socials, Whist Drives and Dances might be a source of meeting our present liabilities, while at the same time they would bring us together more in social enjoyment. I cannot spare the time to organise these things myself, but I will most gratefully accept any offer to run one or more of these entertainments and will do all in my power to back up such efforts.

I have heard it said that the people do not see much of the Vicar. It is quite true in one sense because I cannot at present do a house to house visitation, and even if I did it would take me more than a year to call at each house and then some may be out when I called. But there is no reason why all Church people should not see their Vicar and at least shake hands with him at least once a week. There are three or four opportunities every Sunday if only you would come. I think if you did your part better it would help to increase the family feeling which should

exist between parishioners and their Vicar, and would certainly encourage your Vicar to strain every nerve and muscle to get round and see you in your homes. I do most truly want to know you better individually and to share your troubles and your joys with you. Will you take my suggestion to heart and make it a practice? I can promise you a whole-hearted response.

Again and again I have been asked to change the time of Evensong on Sundays and now I am going to do so as requested. On Sunday, March 6th and for the future, Evensong will begin at half-past six instead of seven o'clock. It is the time that prevails in most parishes and I think it has a good deal in its favour. It gives much more time in the evening for walks, etc., after service and it will allow parents with young children to get to Church at least once a Sunday.

### Finance.

The new Finance Committee met for the first time last Monday and it was enabled to estimate the difficulties before it this year. The Balance brought forward on January 1st, was much less than usual and consequently although the payments made in February are comparatively small, the balance in hand after payment of accounts was but £18. At the March Meeting the accounts presented for payment will be much heavier owing to the quarterly accounts being added to the monthly and in addition the payment of the £40 instalment due for organ repairs will have to be met.

So far this year the inclement weather has caused the weekly income from collections and assessment to be below the normal amount. We feel sure that we have but to inform readers of the position of affairs for them to do their best to help us increase our balance during the present month. Help can be given by donations to the Assessment or Freewill Offering Fund or by special donations towards the organ repair account or towards the upkeep of the Churchyard to name two only of the items of expenditure causing the Committee anxiety at the present time.

We hope next month to give an estimate of expenditure for the year and meantime make this urgent appeal for help to avoid a deficit before one third of the year has passed.
